South Beaverdam Lake is located in a remote area of Twp.26ED. There is no good road access to this lake, but canoes and small boats can be launched in the outlet to gain access. Due to the difficult access conditions, the pond is lightly fished.

Chain pickerel provide the biggest fishery here. Bass appear to be relatively few, but they are of above-average size. There are also lots of big fallfish in this lake.

The outlet produces a fair number of trout as well as providing nursery habitat for juvenile Atlantic salmon. The occasional 2 to 3-pound brook trout taken in the lake probably originated in the outlet.

This lake is open to fishing from October 1-31 for all species except trout, salmon, and togue.
