

## Data are from the MAINE VITAL STATISTICS SYSTEM: 1970 - 2000 (preliminary)

INCREASED MATERNAL AGE

- There is a trend in Maine, and in the country, for women to delay childbirth. In 1970, there were 17,837 births in Maine; 1,120 of those births (6.3%) were to women 35 years old or older. In 2000, the total number of Maine births had declined to 13,590; however, the number of births to older mothers had increased to 1.875 babies (13.8%).
- Over that 30 year period, the proportion of births to Maine women younger than 35 declined by 8% while the proportion of births to women 35 years old or older more than doubled.



- ➡ In Maine, the average age of mothers increased by 3.1 years between 1970 and 2000, from 24.6 years old to 27.7. Nationally, the increase was 2.6 years, from 24.6 years old in 1970 to 27.2 in 2000.
- During that time, the age increases were even greater for 1st time mothers. The age of 1st time mothers grew by more than 4 years in Maine, from 21.2 years old to 25.3. Nationally, the age of 1st time mothers increased by 3.5 years, from 21.4 years old to nearly 25 years old.
- ➡ When compared to other New England states, Maine ranked 5th for in
  - crease in the average age of 1st time mothers; nationally, Maine ranked 9th.
- ➡ In 2000, more than 5% of births to Maine mothers 35 years old or older were multiple births - twins, triplets, or quadruplets - a proportion nearly twice as high as that for younger mothers.
