Explore science and engineering If you have set up a terrarium, draw a picture about what's happening inside it. If you have not set up a terrarium yet, try it! Use a plastic container or large jar. Collect some soil and plants from outside, and add some sticks and dried leaves. Plants will need water. A spray bottle of water will help keep the habitat healthy.
