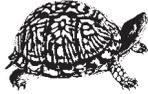

## WILDLIFE DIVISION

### Dams Receive Upgrade - Written by John Pratte

Many of our wildlife management areas have dams creating freshwater marshes supporting wildlife ranging from birds, mammals and fish, to invertebrates, amphibians and reptiles that depend on wetlands at some point in their lifecycle. The primary objective is to maintain small wetlands for waterfowl and wading bird nesting, resting, brood rearing, and sanctuary.

Hunting pressure in the Merrymeeting Bay area is frequently heavy. Large numbers of ducks, primarily black duck, mallards, blue and green-winged teal, wood ducks and Canada geese seek these small marshes for sanctuary. This in turn tends to hold waterfowl in the bay area longer and provide additional hunting opportunity.

Three of the eight earthen dams on Swan Island have deteriorated from rusted-out culverts, storm damage, muskrat damage and old age. These were likely built in the 1950's providing many decades of waterfowl habitat. This upgrade consisted of larger culverts to handle today's increased storm frequency and severity; repairs to the dam structure and armoring of the emergency outflow.

In conjunction with the dam repair we have resumed seeding a couple acres of the adjacent field, modified our field mowing, and will be adding a couple duck boxes to further enhance the area for waterfowl.

From the Commissioner's Office...

- Public hearings continued in August and the Commissioner conducted two hearings for proposed changes to Maine's Endangered and Threatened species listing. The Department will be presenting changes to the list to the IF&W Legislative Committee when they reconvene for the 127th session.
- The Commissioner also conducted a public hearing regarding the proposed migratory bird hunting season.
- The Commissioner's Advisory Council met and gave their consent to adopt several new rules: the 2014-2015 Migratory Bird seasons; addition of WMDs 10, 11 and 19 to fall turkey hunting; set any-deer permit allocations; set the 2015-2016 crow season dates and made changes to the Commercial Whitewater rating rules.
- Commissioner Woodcock attended the 2014 Oquossoc Days at the Outdoor Sporting Heritage Museum to kick off the Maine Warden Service premiere of a brand new exhibit. The "Final Charge" was also on display along with the Operation Game Thief exhibit trailer.
- The Commissioner also attended the Advanced Warden Academy graduation ceremony at the Maine Criminal Justice Academy.
- Both the Commissioner and Deputy were present at the annual employee recognition festivities held at the Eddington Salmon Club and Lake St. George State Park. Awards were distributed, a BBQ was served, and the Commissioner's ended the event at Lake St. George by meeting an ALS ice bucket challenge! (pictures on page 4)

## FISHERIES & HATCHERIES DIVISION

In late summer, regional fisheries staff participated in small boat emergency procedure training. The course was provided by Joe Mokry at Ocean Rescue Systems International. The course covered ditching, sinking, fire, and survival for open water and ice conditions. A field component focused on rescuing people from the water, righting a flipped boat and a sunken canoe. Additionally, new equipment and survival gear were evaluated for field staff.

### Lots of Options to Get the Lead Out!

As part of the Fish Lead-Free initiative that we are partnering on with Maine Audubon, Sportsman's Alliance of Maine, Maine B.A.S.S. Nation, Maine Lakes Society, and the Soil & Water Conservation Districts, MDIFW now has lead tackle collection bins at each of our 7 regional offices, as well as our Augusta and Bangor offices. These 9 locations are in addition to 8 transfer stations with bins. Visit [fishleadfree.org](http://fishleadfree.org) to find the bin closest to you and get the lead out of YOUR tackle box today!

### Did You Know?...

#### Lead poisoning is the leading cause of death for adult Common Loons in Maine.

One-third of adult loons collected over the last twenty-five years died from lead poisoning, a direct result of the ingestion of lost or discarded lead sinkers and lead-headed jigs. Lead is highly toxic and loons will die within two to three weeks after they ingest just one small lead object.

#### Maine has a new Fish Lead-Free Law.

Maine has banned the use and sale of lead sinkers 1 ounce or less. The sale of bare lead-headed jigs 2 1/2" long or less will be banned in September 2016, followed by a ban on use in September 2017.

#### There are dozens of lead-free tackle products on the market.

Now's the time to switch to lead-free fishing gear made from bismuth, tungsten, steel and other non-toxic materials. Look for them at your favorite tackle shop or online retailer, or find a location listed on [fishleadfree.org](http://fishleadfree.org).

#### We can help you host your own tackle exchange event.

Exchanges may be a one-time event or may be on-going. We supply a kit with informational brochures, an inventory of lead-free sinkers and jigs, and a collection container for lead tackle.

#### Fish Lead-Free is funded by the Maine Outdoor Heritage Fund through 2015.
