

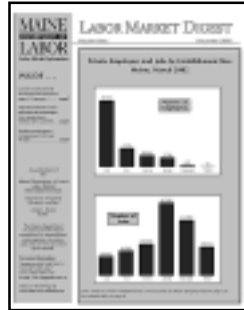
What jobs pay the most?

MAINE CIVILIAN LABOR FORCE ESTIMATES presents annual average labor force estimates for counties, labor market areas, and cities and towns.



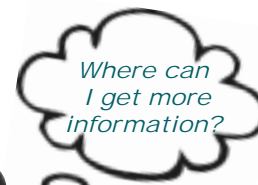
What industries are expected to grow the most?

EMPLOYMENT CHANGE IN MAINE ranks all industries, beginning with those projected to grow the most and ending with those projected to decline the most, between 2000 and 2010.

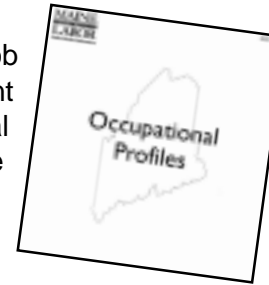
What is a labor market and where is mine?

The LABOR MARKET AREA MAP shows all 35 Maine labor market areas by numerical listing. A labor market area consists of an economically integrated geographical area within which workers can reside and find employment within a reasonable distance or can change employment without changing their place of residence.



What is this career about?

OCCUPATIONAL PROFILES contain job descriptions, average wages, employment outlook, skills and aptitudes, educational requirements and related jobs for a wide range of occupations.



What does this job pay?

MAINE OCCUPATIONAL WAGES provides employment and wage data by occupation for more than 700 occupations in Maine and its six substate areas.

What's the best approach to my job search?

JOB HUNTING IN MAINE: PUTTING THE PIECES TOGETHER gives tips and techniques on résumés, cover letters and interviews, as well as highlights on the many resources available at the CareerCenters.



Do I need a license to do this job?

THE MAINE DIRECTORY OF OCCUPATIONAL LICENSING lists most occupations for which a license, certification or registration is required by state statute as a prerequisite for working in Maine. It lists the licensing agency which may be contacted for detailed requirements.



What web sites and resources can help me plan my career?

WICKED GOOD STUFF FOR JOB SEEKERS identifies internet sites and labor market publications to help individuals make informed career choices.



What skill level is required for this occupation?

OCCUPATIONS IN DEMAND (PROJECTED EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES INDICATOR) details by county and region the most promising projected employment opportunities, their wage rates and their required skill levels.

Is information available on employee benefits?

MAINE FRINGE BENEFIT STUDY summarizes various types of benefits by industry group, employer size, and geographic area, as well as by full-time and part-time workers.



What jobs are anticipated to be in high demand?

HOT JOBS IN MAINE identifies the average hourly wage, employment projections, and where to obtain training for the occupations anticipated to grow the fastest. In addition, these projections are displayed on a poster (not shown here).



Which jobs requiring a college degree are expected to be in high demand?

CAREERS IN MAINE FOR COLLEGE GRADUATES identifies the average hourly wage, employment projections, and where to obtain training for occupations anticipated to grow the fastest and that generally require a college degree (two-year Associate's degree or above).
