Dear Senator Goodall, Representative Duchesne and Natural Resources committee members:

The purpose of this letter is to provide follow-up responses to several questions you posed at your May 27 work session on solid waste.

1. Could we receive a copy of the map of municipal solid waste disposal regions as a handout?

Attached are copies for committee members.

2. How did SPO determine that it would take 2.5 years for the DEP permitting process for a greenfield site?

This time estimate for reviewing a permit application for a new landfill site was provided to the State Planning Office by DEP staff.

3. What's the market value of the Juniper Ridge Landfill?

There are many factors that impact the landfill's value. These include the land and facility improvements, amount of permitted capacity and economic conditions. In addition, there are multiple ways to value the landfill. It could be based on revenue value (per ton revenue of current and projected capacity); market value (location, status and lifespan of permits, potential for expansion, scarcity of landfill capacity); or cost (cost of operations and facility and business worth), or some combination. It would require a professional appraiser to assess its resale value.

4. What is the basis for providing notice to the Legislature for the need for additional disposal capacity?

In a separate memo, we have provided an analysis of the statutory requirements for triggering recommendations for new landfill capacity. That memo is attached.

5. How much waste does Maine export for disposal outside the state?

Maine exports about 60,000 tons of municipal solid waste per year, or 3.3% of the total waste generated.

6. What is SPO's total cost to administer the Juniper Ridge Landfill?

Multiple staff within the State Planning Office play a role in overseeing the Juniper Ridge Landfill. Work from six policy and program staff (including the State Planning Office Director) contributes to overseeing day-day operations and contract management, responding to citizen inquiries, maintaining the Juniper Ridge Landfill website, supplying information to legislative committees, and providing clerical support.

The SPO staff monitors landfill operations through on-site visits and communication with landfill staff, and by responding to citizen complaints, attending meetings of the Old Town Advisory Committee, and reviewing reports and manifests.

We estimate that the combined efforts of the multiple staff equal 1.25 FTEs¹ and the collective annual salary and benefits for these hours are \$106,331.² The number of hours will fluctuate over time, with more hours required during permitting and construction of the landfill expansion or to respond to special legislative reports or study committees, for example.

7. How much waste is generated by state government? How much does the state recycle?

We have asked the State's Bureau of General Services to provide the Committee with this information.

8. What is SPO's wish list of state policy changes to increase recycling?

What would it cost?

SPO has prepared a separate presentation on this topic.

9. What is the term of the Operating Services Agreement (OSA) for the Juniper Ridge Landfill?

30 years, unless terminated in accordance with the terms of the contract.

10. Would an expansion of the Crossroads Landfill at Norridgewock impact the OSA?

No, but we would need to review the proposed legislation to see if there are any specific concerns.

11. Can the OSA be renegotiated?

The OSA can only be amended upon written consent of both parties. Any renegotiation would have to take into account the Acquisition Agreement and the Fuel Supply Agreement.

¹ It should be noted that in addition to SPO's landfill oversight duties, the Office is responsible for developing disposal capacity projections, writing the annual waste generation and disposal capacity reports, monitoring landfill capacity, prices, and competition, and developing policy options for the Governor and Legislature. These tasks are not included in the above cost estimate. The Office estimates it uses 2 FTEs to carry out both its solid waste disposal planning and oversight functions.


² The bulk of these costs are borne by the dedicated Maine Solid Waste Management Fund. Some policy and legislative work is performed by General Fund positions.

12. If the legislature were to impose a surcharge on tipping fees at JRL, would that impact the OSA?

No. The state can impose fees in addition to fees that are required in the OSA.

An Analysis of the Statutory Trigger for Recommending New Solid Waste Disposal Capacity under 38 MRSA §2156-A

Prepared by the State Planning Office for the
Joint Standing Committee on Natural Resources

June 14, 2010

Maine law directs the State Planning Office to recommend the construction and operation of a state-owned disposal facility when 6 years or less of licensed, available capacity remain statewide for municipal solid waste and/or special waste (see 38 MRSA, section 2156-A attached).

What is required of the State Planning Office under this law?

The State Planning Office must report to the Natural Resources Committee of the Legislature. The report must include:

- a recommendation to construct and operate a state-owned disposal facility for disposal of the type of waste for which capacity is needed (municipal solid waste or special waste);
- a recommendation on which state agency will own the facility and how it will be operated;
- a review of disposal options outside of the State;
- a review of existing efforts to reduce, reuse, recycle, compost and incinerate the affected municipal solid waste and special waste streams and the impact of these efforts on capacity requirements; and
- a thorough economic analysis of the facility's expected costs, commitments from entities that would use the facility, and projected revenues.

The Office estimates it will take 3-4 months to assemble this report, particularly for the economic and financial analysis.

Should the State Planning Office “pull the trigger” now?

While the law requires the State Planning Office to notify the Natural Resources Committee when 6 years of capacity remain statewide, the Office is also required to report to the committee annually with capacity projections so that there are “no surprises.” In its March 2010 capacity report, the Office alerted the committee that Maine has a combined total (state-owned and private) of 8 years of capacity for municipal solid waste and special wastes together (perhaps +/- one year depending on the pace of Maine’s economic recovery and other variables). The addition of a public benefit determination requirement lengthens the permitting process for new disposal capacity, by perhaps as much as a year. With these considerations in mind, the State Planning Office is monitoring the situation closely.

What does the State Planning Office recommend at this time?

In its report to the Natural Resources Committee, *Assessment of State-owned Landfill Management and Oversight* (February 5, 2010), the State Planning Office recommended that the statutory trigger for notification of limited remaining disposal capacity be changed from 6 years to 8 years of remaining capacity. Barring any change in the statute, the Office will notify the

Natural Resources Committee under 38 MRSA §2156-A when it finds that 6 years of statewide disposal capacity remains.

What is the relationship of Juniper Ridge Landfill capacity to the “trigger”?

Juniper Ridge Landfill disposal capacity is related to the question of statewide disposal capacity, but the expansion of this existing state-owned disposal facility is governed by more than the question of whether 6 years of disposal capacity remain in Maine in the aggregate.

The Juniper Ridge Operating Services Agreement (OSA) requires the state-owned landfill operator to submit an expansion application by February 2009. In turning the landfill over to the State, the Old Town mill owners required this provision to guarantee disposal capacity for the mill, and Lincoln Pulp and Paper, at the Juniper Ridge Landfill for 15 years; or, if that is impossible, at another facility owned by the Juniper Ridge Landfill operator. (At the time of the OSA, the operator’s private facility, Pine Tree Landfill, was open and an expansion was contemplated. The Pine Tree Landfill, under an agreement with the Department of Environmental Protection, closed in December 2009 with remaining capacity. There will therefore be no additional disposal capacity occurring at the Pine Tree Landfill.)

After completion of the OSA, the Legislature changed the law to apply regulatory public benefit provisions to state-owned facilities. Previously it had been presumed that the resolve authorizing the state-owned landfill in Old Town signified its public benefit. In compliance, then, with the OSA timeline, the Juniper Ridge Operator, in consultation with the Office, submitted a public benefit determination application in 2009. That application was withdrawn when the Department of Environmental Protection determined it would not grant a public benefit determination without additional information. The application will be resubmitted when the Juniper Ridge Landfill operator determines after consultation with the DEP that it can respond to the questions posed.

In early 2010, the State Planning Office verified that approximately 5.5 years of capacity remains at the Juniper Ridge Landfill. Since there is other landfill capacity in Maine, this does not by itself trigger the statutory notification of 6 years of remaining disposal capacity.

“Trigger” Statutory Language

38 §2156-A. Facility development

1. Planning for development. The office shall plan for the development of facilities sufficient to meet needs for municipal solid waste identified in the state plan and any revisions to the plan and to serve all geographic areas of the State. The office may plan for the development of facilities sufficient to meet needs for special waste identified in the state plan and any revisions to the plan and to serve all geographic areas of the State.

[1995, c. 588, §6 (NEW) .]

2. Recommendation for development. When the office finds that 6 years or less of licensed and available disposal capacity for municipal solid waste or special waste remains within the State, the office shall submit a report recommending the construction and operation of a state-owned solid waste disposal facility for the disposal of the type of waste for which capacity is needed to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over natural resource matters. The report must recommend which state agency or department will own the facility and how it will be operated. The report must also include a review of disposal options outside of the State; a review of existing efforts to reduce, reuse, recycle, compost and incinerate the affected municipal solid waste and special waste streams and the impact of these efforts on capacity requirements; a thorough economic analysis of the facility's expected costs; and commitments from entities to utilize the facility and projected revenues. It is the intent of the Legislature that the facility be operated by a private contractor. A state-owned solid waste disposal facility may not be constructed or operated unless authorized by legislation pursuant to subsection 3.

[2007, c. 192, §6 (AMD) .]

3. Authorization for development. The joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over natural resource matters may report out legislation authorizing construction and operation of a state-owned solid waste disposal facility in response to a report submitted pursuant to subsection 2.

[1995, c. 588, §6 (NEW) .]

4. Ownership, construction and operation. The office shall maintain ownership of a site acquired for construction of a state-owned solid waste disposal facility until the Legislature authorizes transfer of the site to another state department or agency, except that this subsection does not prohibit any lease or transfer of the site pursuant to an agreement entered into before the effective date of this subsection or pursuant to any amendment to such an agreement entered into before or after the effective date of this subsection.

5. Development by others. This section does not preclude a municipality or regional association from developing and operating solid waste disposal facilities on its own initiative.
