Approval of October 9, 2012 Commission Meeting Minutes	Copy of minutes received by all Commissioners.	Commissioner Glazier moved for the approval of the minutes. Commissioner Roy seconded. All present voted in favor. Approved.
Operations Reports Review	<p>Director Pelletier presented the <u>October 2012 Operations Reports</u> to the Commissioners. In October, there were a high number of submitted cases and a high number of new cases. Director Pelletier advised that the Commission should look carefully at the numbers for November and December and reassess at the December meeting to determine whether the Commission should review the supplemental budget. The average voucher price decreased in October.</p> <p>Commission Spierer asked how many vouchers over the average had been submitted. Director Pelletier did not have an exact figure, but indicated that he would keep track and report back to the Commissioners if the totals were high.</p> <p>Director Pelletier explained that for the past four months, the Revenue Account has been below the Commission's target number. However, during the months of January, February, and March, the Commission will most likely see an increase in the collections because of the tax off-set program. The authorization for the Conference Account has been submitted and is currently pending.</p> <p>Commissioner Mitchell expressed some concern about the trend in the collections running below expectations. Director Pelletier reported that the six screeners attended a staff meeting at the central office last month. He explained that the new screeners are</p>

	<p>catching up for the time periods where there was no screener in place. Director Pelletier informed the Commissioners that Elizabeth Bedard, the Bangor screener, had resigned and that he is working on filling the vacant position. He indicated that it is a several month process. Director Pelletier thanked Elizabeth for her service and wished her well.</p>	
<p>Executive Branch Meetings Update</p>	<p>Chair Mitchell gave an overview of the meetings he and Director Pelletier had with Commissioner Millet and Governor LePage. During both meetings the topic of the Commission's proposed rule-making was discussed as well as the issue of funding the proposed rate increase for counsel fees. Following the meeting, Governor LePage approved of the Commission's rule-making so it can now move forward at the Secretary of State's Office.</p> <p>Commissioner Carey informed the Commission that prior to Chair Mitchell and Director Pelletier's two meetings he was contacted by Michael Cianchette, the Governor's Chief Legal Counsel, about the proposed rate increase and how the Commission arrived at its numbers. Commissioner Carey stated that there are other groups advocating for the rate increase, including the Maine State Bar Association, the Maine Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers, and the Maine Trial Lawyers Association. Commission Carey confirmed that MACDL is seeking to hire a legislative advocate for this issue.</p> <p>Commissioner Sprier inquired about what the next step will be in the process. Chair Mitchell explained that the Commission will go through the rule-making process now that the Governor's office has signed off on the Commission's request. Director Pelletier elaborated that the Governor had imposed a requirement via executive order that all Executive Branch agencies and commissions must first receive the Governor's approval before any rule-making can be pursued. Dan Billings informed Director Pelletier that this executive order did not apply to independent boards and commissions, but the Secretary of State instructed its staff to refuse any rule-making application that did not have prior approval from the Governor's office.</p>

Rule-making Update	<p>Director Pelletier confirmed that the public hearing will be held on December 11, 2012, at 1:00 pm. Director Pelletier informed the Commissioners that he was nearly finished with the paperwork and would submit it to the Secretary of State's Office later that day. He explained that public notice would appear in the newspaper a week from tomorrow.</p> <p>Commission Sprier commented that the Commission can set the rate and pay attorneys what it wants, but that the Commission would run out of money. Chair Mitchell reiterated the importance of adopting the rate increase since attorneys are leaving our rosters and the rate is a deciding factor for these attorneys. Commissioner Carey explained that Sarah Churchill has left our rosters, which is a major loss, and that this should serve as a good example to use during the Commission's discussions with the Legislature during the upcoming session.</p>	
Training Update	<p>Deputy Director Brogan informed the Commissioners about the upcoming minimum standards trainings that will be held in November and December.</p> <p>Commissioner Carey suggested that since the Commission has over \$8,000 in its training account, it should consider providing advanced training in all areas that is free or at a low cost.</p> <p>Commissioner Mitchell questioned whether live minimum standards training will be held in the future and whether the videos have become outdated. Director Pelletier believes that the videos are not outdated yet and that conducting a live presentation for only 15 to 20 people presents an issue since that might not be a sufficient audience.</p>	
Miscellaneous new business	<p>Commissioner Carey presented some new business not included on the agenda. He suggested that the DefenderData system be refined to allow attorneys to select which case types they would accept at different courts. He has been hearing from clerks that it is frustrating that they cannot simply work off the list since some attorneys tell the clerk's office that they don't accept particular case types even though they are listed on the rosters. Director Pelletier said that he would talk to the people who manage the DefenderData system about tailoring the courts and eligibility functions to allow for this.</p>

Attached you will find the November, 2012 Operations Reports for your review and our discussion at the upcoming Commission meeting on November 13, 2012. A summary of the operations reports follows:

- 1,906 new cases were opened in the DefenderData system in November.
- The number of vouchers submitted electronically in November was 2,311 totaling \$943,716.42. We paid 2,402 electronic vouchers totaling \$967,115.93.
- There were no paper vouchers submitted in November.
- The average price per voucher in November was \$402.63. For Fiscal Year 2013 the average price per voucher is \$398.45.
- Appeals and Post Conviction Review cases were the highest average vouchers in November.

In our All Other Account, the total expenses for the month of November were \$1,040,258.62. Of that amount, only \$8,742.35 was devoted to the Commission's operating expenses.

In the Personal Services Account, we had \$40,076.59 in expenses for the month of November.

In the Revenue Account, our monthly transfer from the Judicial Branch for counsel fees for the month of November, which reflects October's collections, totaled 59,172.43, our best month of collections so far this fiscal year.

In November, we collected \$1900.00 in registration fees for the December trainings, bringing our Conference Account total balance \$9,963.93.
