Congressional Medal of Honor Project

A great idea for a Service Learning Project, students will study a local Congressional Medal of Honor recipient, work with the community to record an existing memorial or establish a memorial for the recipient. Native American History and Culture Essay Contest

Open to both middle and high schools, this contest is designed to give students an opportunity to showcase what they have learned through Maine Native American Studies. Winners receive an opportunity for their class to view rare Native American Treaties at the Maine State Archives in Augusta. All participants receive an award certificate. Maine National History Day

An opportunity to meet MLR standards in many disciplines, History Day is part of a nationwide program that offers middle and high school students a chance to compete at the state level by producing a historical paper, exhibit, documentary, website or performance. There are individual and group divisions in all but the paper category.

The state contest will be held at the University of Maine at Augusta on Wednesday, March 24, 2010. First and second place state winners in all categories at both the junior and senior level qualify to attend National History Day at the University of Maryland in June. Maine Constitution Poster and Essay Contest

One of our most popular programs, this contest gives students in grades K-12 an opportunity to “show what they know” about Maine. Winners receive an invite for their class to view the original Maine Constitution at the Maine State Archives in Augusta. All participants receive an award certificate. Eighth Grade Citizenship Awards

In 2009, 135 schools honored a graduating eighth grader with the Secretary of State’s Citizenship Award. Students are recognized for their civic awareness, scholastic achievements and community service. Many schools request a legislator to present the certificate at their awards ceremony. Student Presentations at the Maine State Archives

The teachers and classes that visit the Maine State Archives as part of their prize for winning a student contest repeatedly tell us how much they enjoyed the experience and how surprised they are at the resources available at the Archives. We would like to gauge interest in offering scheduled presentations to classes in grades 4-12.

A presentation begins with a discussion of the necessity of a state archive and the different types of records in our holdings. Our archivists will display and explain examples of our Native American holdings, those pertaining to the Maine Constitution, or the Civil War and tailor it to your region of the state. If you have a particular topic that you are interested in exploring with your class at the Archives outside of the 3 listed above, you may inquire about the possibility of a presentation.
