**Heating Oil Prices Continue to Drop**

Augusta--- The Governor’s Office of Energy Independence and Security (OEIS) conducted the weekly oil survey and has found that the current statewide average cash price for No. 2 heating oil to be at **\$2.10 per gallon** dropping \$.05 since last week.

“Heating oil prices have fallen to their lowest point since 2005 reflection a drop in demand, an increase in inventories, and an overall global drop in economic activity,” says OEIS Director John Kerry.

It is important to note that the price for heating oil is a statewide average and that prices in a given geographic region of the state may be considerably higher or lower than the statewide average. Within the OEIS sample, the lowest actual heating oil price of \$1.62 per gallon was found in the Southwestern region. The high-end price of \$2.35 per gallon was found in the Northern region. At the time of this release the price of WTI crude oil, major driver of refined product prices, including heating oil was \$34.45 down more than five dollars from last week. The statewide kerosene price average is \$2.56 per gallon at this time. The table below provides current Maine cash prices in dollars rounded to the nearest penny.

Today’s propane price survey found statewide average to be \$2.78 per gallon which is \$.01 higher than last week. The average price for propane represents the price per gallon for a 600-800 gallon domestic heating application.

February’s average natural gas price for the state is \$1.40 per therm for residential customers. That translates into \$14 per million btu’s of energy for natural gas, compared with \$16.61 per MMBTU for heating oil and \$31 per MMBTU for propane at this week’s price.
