


Health Care Resources

- ► Physicians: 107 physicians (MD and DO) indicated that they were practicing in Aroostook county. 40% of these physicians (43) reported practicing in a primary care* specialty: this is significantly lower than the national figure of 47%.
- Registered Nurses: There were 531 registered nurses practicing their profession in Aroostook county resulting in a nurse to physician ratio of 5 nurses for every doctor, more than half again as much as the national ratio of 3 nurses per doctor. This difference is statistically significant.
- ▶ Dentists: 28 dentists reported working in Aroostook county. The resulting ratio of .3 dentists for every 1,000 residents compares to the state ratio of .4/1,000, and the national ratio of .6/1,000.
- ► Hospitals: There were 4 hospitals in Aroostook county (one with two sites) with a total of 296 general use hospital beds. This yielded a county ratio of 3.4 beds per 1.000 residents; statewide this ratio was 3.5 per 1,000 population; nationwide it was 4.0/1,000.



Nursing Homes: There were 10 long term care facilities with 809 nursing home beds in 1992; this represented a county rate of 72 nursing home beds per 1,000 elderly population; this is significantly greater than the nationwide ratio of 48 beds per 1,000 elderly.

All county rates were compared to national rates when possible; unless noted, differences in rates were not statistically significant, i.e., they could be accounted for by chance alone.
