


KENNEBEC COUNTY: 1992 Health Care Resources

- Physicians: 304 physicians (MD and DO) reported practicing in Kennebec county. 39% of these physicians (118) reported practicing in a primary care* specialty; this compares to the national average of 47%. This county has the 2nd best ratio to population for physicians and primary care physicians in the state.
- Registered Nurses: There were 1.130 registered nurses practicing their profession in Kennebec county resulting in a nurse to physician ratio of 3.7 nurses for every doctor; the national ratio is 3 nurses per doctor.
- Dentists: 53 dentists reported working in Kennebec county. The resulting ratio of .5 dentists for every 1,000 residents compares to the state ratio of .4/1,000; it is however, significantly less than the national ratio of .6/1,000.
- Hospitals: There were 4 hospitals in Kennebec county (one with 2 sites) with a total of 543 general use hospital beds and 208 acute psychiatric beds. This yielded a county ratio of 4.6 general use hospital beds per 1,000 residents; statewide the ratio was 3.5 per 1,000. This is significantly different than the nationwide ratio of



Nursing Homes: There were 14 long term care facilities with 1,153 nursing home beds in 1992 (90 of these are connected to a state mental health institute); this represented a county ratio of 65 general use nursing home beds per 1,000 elderly population compared to the national ratio of 48 beds/1,000 elderly; the difference is statistically significant.

All county rates were compared to national rates when possible; unless noted, differences in rates were not statistically significant, i.e., they could be accounted for by chance alone.
