HOME BIRTHS: CHARACTERISTICS OF MOTHER



▶ During the 10 year period, 1988 - 1997, 1,336 babies were born at home in Maine: this was nearly 1% of live births -**Number of Live Births:** Maine 1988 - 1997 20,000 a rate consistent with what was ob-

served nationally.


Although the number of live births steadily declined during the period with a total drop of more than 20%, the number of home births fluctuated from a high of 177 in 1990 to a low of 95 the following year; however, the 10 year period ended as it began with 123 home births in both 1988 and 1997.

- ► Less than half (46%) of the women who delivered their babies at home had 11 or more prenatal care visits; this compared to 68% of mothers who delivered in birthing facilities.
- Mothers who delivered their baby at home were more likely to be older than 25 years old, married, and have post high school education.

- Although most infants born at home were delivered by a midwife, only 7% of those midwives were certified. Of the infants born in birthing facilities who were delivered by midwives, 98% were certified.
- Mothers who delivered at home had a greater number of previous births than other mothers. On average, women who delivered at home had 11/2 previous births for each previous birth of women who delivered in other places.

Notes: For this analysis, home births are defined as all births which did not occur in a birthing facility. Tabulations exclude births which had unknown data for 1 or more of the variables being analyzed All differences in rates are statistically significant, i.e., they could not be accounted for by chance alone.
