

Description: Narrative of the voyage to Pemaquid signed by Joshua Scottow

1677

28 August. Narrative of ye Voyage to Pemmaquid,

3. (6.) 1677. We sailed from Boston, In ye afternoon.

- We came up with Blackpoint In ye morning early, Saw 3 Shallops who ran from us. about 4 o Clock In ye afternoon came up with Sagwin, Saw a Catch, took her for an Enimy, & provided accordingly, came In to Pemmaquid about 9 o Clock that night.
- 5. I Landed at Fort Charles presented your Honours Respects, & Delivered your Letter

to Captain Brockers. & was civilly Intertained, who hearing of ^ McPerson of Bost==ton who had arrived there 3 or 4 hours afore me. That I was in y' sloope who cam came In so late that night, before he told me Captain Brockers told me that he had dispatcht away an Indian that morning very early to Penobscut, so desire Medockawando to come to him, to know his mind as to Salem Catches and their Company, & to a peace.

- Captain Brockers Capt Nicols & McPerson, went up Damariscotty River In this Linnaer, & came down that night.
- 13 Cannoes came down Corbinsound to Pemaquid about an hour afore sunset, Capⁿ

Capt. Brockers Commanding all y^e Soldiers in h his fort. I went aboard y^e Sloope. after

- 8. Capt.^a Brockers sent for me ashore, when soon ^ came Squando Sagamore of Said & Tererumkin & another Sagamore of Amoscoggin, with y^e Sagamore of Pegwack==ett, who had Come down y^e Day before with their Retinnue, Simon & 2 more Indians came down that morning In a Cannoe, who after a debate Confirmd & signd y^e Articles formerly agreed to by Mosey &c, & promised to deliver up 9 Captives with all speed, 8 of them being Pegwakitt; The Same day Retur=ned y^e Indian who had been sent to find Medockawando, Saying that he could not find him, & that Casteen & the french had left theire house with y^e doores open, & 4 barrels of Flower in it, Simon and Diogenes that day by order from Capt Brockers came aboard to see y^e Captives that we had In Hold, Simon Toke y^e Lattle boy out of y^e Hold & would have carried him away, but being Hindered put him down again.
- Gooddy Mills & Mrs Hammons Son Came in with another Sagamore of Amascog =gin, who made his peace allso & delivered them up. Disturbance by y Indians arose because we would not deliver up o' Prisners, they saying they had delivered up a great many to y English, & why should we keep 6. Insomuch as I was

advised by Capt[®] Brockers to go to Munhiggin or Damariscove with my-^ Sloope. I told him I would not for there we were under y[®] security of his Fort d. & y[®] other vessels which Rode by us.

[scratched out] Diogenes Sent aboard with our Indian man & a squaw to see ye Prisners, about
13. noon Capte Brockers sent for me ashoare & desired me upon ye Complaint of
ye Indians to him, to let ye prisners aboard have ye Priveledge of ye Decke,
which was very acceptable to us, having Cleansed ye Hold that Day.

[scratched out] Medockawando arrived at Fort Charles with his Retinnue, 3 indians sent 17—aboard to see of Prisners.

- 8 Capt^a Brockers. Sent a guard early for to have of Prisners carried ashoare, which was performed accordingly. I went spedily ashore, when after some Little Space Madockawando Came again in y^e Fort, when after Reading Hearing of y^e Articles were

If any Injury were done by y^e English to them, they were to Complaine to those Gentlemens, which said Articles were Signed by Capt* Brockers Capt Knapton Capt Nicols Commisoners & by M' Jocelin Justice Medockaw and α said that Major Clarkes Sloop was Lost, Stavd upon y^e Rocks, that he had brought 4 Catches to Penobscot, one of which he came In, and Left at Miscontus, 2 at Penobscot

Falls, and ^ he had delivered to Casteen, for which ye English Prisners (who were Interchanged upon ye signing of ye Articles above), told me that the French on Casteen did deliver, on Casteen to Medockawando 2 barrels of flower, one barrell of wine, one barrell of Tobacco, & about 12 yards of Trucking Cloth & that Casteen was gone last for him, & that there was one or two more left-of ye Catches Left at Mount Desarts. The Captives then Delivered up by Medokawando were 5 men belonging to ye Catches of Salem and Marblehead

- 21 Being a Very Rainy Day we Landed, Sergaint Johnson & $^{\wedge}$ Honnywell y^e day before were sent with 13 Indians to Wells

- 24 The Soildiers that were apointed to stay, ^ 8 of them drew up a Protest, against my acting, both in Regard of ye Insufficiency of ye number left and of their Commander &c, one of them being laid neck and Heels
 - & threatned to be sent bound to Boston, they all Submitted, & Continu^

there, except one to ^ Refused to Tarry upon an oath that he made against it as he pretended, who is at your Honoures dispose, we all got aboard

- 25 About midnight we intended to Saile, having a fair wind all-and to put for at York to attend your Honours orders, but ye wind failing I arose at midnight to dispatch away a soildier with expresses to york & Wells by Land, according to my Instructions.
- 26 We set sail In ye Evening with a fair wind
- 28 We arrived at Boston.
