Describe accomplishments on implementing Governor's Proclamation (attach a copy to this report).

We received a Governor's Proclamation for Asian Longhorned Beetle Awareness Month. Representatives from MDA, Maine Forest Service, USDA APHIS PPQ, State Legislature, and our volunteer network joined the Governor for a ceremonial signing on August 5.

2. Describe accomplishments on selection and survey of two or more high risk communities. (Provide locations, why selected, who was involved in survey, how it was accomplished and results.) Sebago Lake State Park, Casco, ME; August 13-14, 2010.

Site selected due to high risk of introduction through out of state firewood, types of susceptible host trees, high potential for outreach.

Approximately 25 people were involved in the Sebago Lake survey, representing MDA, MFS, USDA APHIS PPQ, MFS interns, volunteer network, family members.

Survey area was divided into 5 sections (<u>map attached</u>); 3-4 surveyors in each section. Length of survey = 2 hours. Maple trees were inspected with binoculars (Pentax Pentium) for signs of ALB (exit holes, egg sites, adult feeding damage, adults...); there were no ash trees. Two different clickers were used to keep track of number of trees inspected and number of people talked to.

Outreach booths and display tables were set up for outreach to park visitors. Results: 1,142 trees inspected; 0 positive. Surveyors tallied 178 people talked to during survey.

Bates College, Lewiston, ME; October 5, 2010

Site selected due to high risk of introduction through nearby industrial parks, railway, types of susceptible host trees, high potential for outreach.

Approximately 15 people were involved in the Lewiston survey, representing MDA, MFS, USDA APHIS PPQ, and volunteer network.

Survey area was divided into 4 sections (<u>map attached</u>); 3 surveyors in each section. Length of survey = 2 hours. Maple trees were inspected with binoculars (Pentax

Pentium) for signs of ALB (exit holes, egg sites, adult feeding damage, adults...); ash trees were inspected for signs of EAB (crown dieback, epicormic branching, bark splits, S-shaped tunnels...). Two different clickers were used to keep track of number of maple trees inspected and number of ash trees inspected.

An outreach booth was set up for outreach to students and staff.

Results: 828 maple trees inspected; 0 positive. 16 ash trees inspected; 0 positive.

- 3. Describe accomplishments on collection and submission of ISIS data at high risk communities. ISIS data was collected for each of the survey events. It was formatted and submitted to PSS for input into ISIS as state cooperator no longer had access to the system.
- 4. Describe accomplishments on delivering Train the Trainer sessions. (How many sessions did you hold, where, how many were trained, did any go on to train additional persons and any other information relative to your training sessions.)
  - Six train-the-trainer sessions were held in Augusta, Bar Harbor, Brunswick, Fryeburg, Rockland, and Wells, with a total of 73 people trained. An additional, abbreviated training was held in Gorham for 20 college students. Training sessions were full-day affairs and covered the history, biology, impacts, recognition of signs and symptoms, etc. of ALB and EAB, with brief mentions of other important invasive forest pests. Tree identification walks were held, and the volunteer coordinator presented ideas on what volunteers can do to help with outreach and spread awareness of ALB and EAB.
  - Many of the volunteers conducted outreach all summer long at farmer's markets, agricultural fairs, summer camp programs, etc.
- 5. Describe accomplishments on outreach events. (How many sessions were held and where, how many people did you reach, list all the events you participated in.)
  Approximately 400 events occurred, but that included volunteers distributing materials (to town offices, libraries, museums, farmers markets, etc.), and news stories. Direct contact events = 240. Full list of events is attached. Our previous and current volunteer coordinators (Anne Bills and Lorraine Taft, respectively) were instrumental in organizing materials and staffing for most of these events.
- 6. Describe accomplishments on media outreach (press releases, radio/TV, internet, etc; attach copies): The individual monthly reports outlined the media coverage we had throughout the year, but the standouts were the Sebago Lake event on WGME 13 news, and the Bug-Maineia event on WABI 5 news. The Maine Forest Service, who has a PR person, was very successful at getting coverage for hemlock woolly adelgid and firewood stories, which would always mention ALB and EAB.
- 7. Describe accomplishments on showing Lurking in the Trees.

  Lurking in the Trees was shown 7 times in different parts of the state (see attached list of events). It also aired on Maine Public Broadcasting Network a number of times. We also showed the other ALB documentary, Bugged, to live audiences.
- 8. Describe accomplishments on development of outreach materials: (attach copies to this report)
  We developed frisbees to strengthen our outreach with kids and continued using the materials we developed in 2009, e.g. the ALB brochure, the ALB pencils, and the ALB comparison sheets. We also developed new incentive items (e.g. baseball hats and water bottles) for our volunteers to encourage lots of outreach.

- 9. Describe accomplishments on development of state internal email lists/list serves for notification of volunteers. (how many are on your list; did you use the list and if so for what purposes)
  An access database was developed to track the volunteer network. Names, contact info, affiliations, etc. of everyone that attended our trainings are in the database. A distribution list containing 142 email addresses of volunteers, state counterparts, and others who have expressed interest in the project, was created to receive regular messages mentioning updated information on ALB/EAB, seeking help with upcoming activities, or urging folks to report any outreach that was conducted.
- 10. Describe accomplishments on other activities not elaborated on above that supported FPOSP. Facebook and Twitter pages (BugWatchME) were created to help disseminate information on ALB, EAB and other invasive pests. Our BugWatchME facebook page has 121 followers, and our twitter page has 87 followers and 8 lists following our tweets. Postings are made at least once per week. Screen shots of each are attached.

WHEREAS, Maine has 17 million acres of forested land and half is comprised of hardwood trees that enhance the state's air and water quality, natural landscapes, recreational destinations, wildlife habitats, property values, and the forest and agricultural economy through timber harvesting, maple syrup production and landscape tree sales; and

WHEREAS, the Asian Longhorned Beetle has already killed tens of thousands of hardwood trees in these four states, and damage may reach into the billions of dollars if the beetle is not eradicated; and

WHEREAS, efforts undertaken in Maine as well as in Connecticut, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island and Vermont in partnership with private and nonprofit organizations, universities, and local, state and federal government, are helping to protect the billions of threatened hardwood trees in the United States; and

WHEREAS, Maine has been proactive in preventing the introduction of the Asian Longhorned Beetle, through outreach, education and surveys; and

WHEREAS, all Mainers have a responsibility to stop the introduction of the Asian longhorned beetle by remaining vigilant; halting transport of firewood, nursery trees, or logs from quarantined areas; and increasing their understanding and awareness of the Asian Longhorned Beetle and its severe potential impacts on the environment and economy,


