

Watercraft Check Points

Prevent the Spread of Invasive Aquatic Species

- Clean off mud, plants, and debris
- Drain boat, motor and equipment away from the ramp after exiting.
- Dry boat and equipment before using in another waterbody
- Never leave waters with live fish, or release plants or animals into a body of water unless they came out of that body of water.



Inspect all parts of the boat and trailer where plants may be caught including the areas shown in the diagram.

What do you do if you find a suspicious plant?

- 1) E-mail a close-up, digital picture to DEP at milfoil@maine.gov. Include the lake name, date, and boat registration number **AND**
- 2) Keep the plant moist and cool until DEP has contacted you with an identification. We may ask you to mail us the plant fragment if we can't identify the plant using the photo.

What's suspicious?

- Any plant on a boat or equipment (anchor, lines, fishing gear, trailer) removed from a lake with a known infestation should be considered suspicious.
- Any plant that you don't recognize as a native plant from your fishing experience.

If in doubt, contact DEP Invasive Species Program. If it's not suspicious, throw it in the trash.
