# EXHIBIT 1

This notice will be supplemented with any new significant facts learned subsequent to its submission. By providing this notice, the City of Tucson, Arizona (the "City") does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Maine law, the applicability of the Maine data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

#### **Nature of the Data Event**

On May 29, 2022, the City learned of suspicious activity involving a user's network account credential. The City quickly began to investigate this report and worked with third party forensic specialists to review City systems to determine the full nature and scope of this event. On August 4, 2022, the City learned that certain files may have been copied and taken from the City's network. Following this discovery, the City undertook a comprehensive review of the information potentially at issue to determine whether any personal information was contained therein, and to whom it relates so to provide notice. On September 12, this review concluded, and the review determined that the information at issue included certain personal information. The City then worked to locate address information for the potentially affected individuals.

The information that could have been subject to unauthorized access includes name and Social Security number.

### **Notice to Maine Residents**

On September 23, 2022, the City began notifying potentially impacted individuals. On September 29, 2022, the City continued providing written notice and provided written notice of this incident to thirty-three (33) Maine residents. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as *Exhibit A*.

### Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the event, the City moved quickly to investigate and respond to the incident, assess the security of the City systems, and identify potentially affected individuals. The City is also working to implement additional safeguards and training to its employees. The City is providing access to credit monitoring services for one (1) year, through Experian, to individuals whose personal information was potentially affected by this incident, at no cost to these individuals.

Additionally, the City is providing impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud. The City is providing individuals with information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one's credit, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud.

The City of Tucson, Arizona (the "City") writes to notify you of a recent event that may affect the security of some of your personal information. We are providing you with information about the event, our response to it, and steps you can take in addition to those you take daily to protect your personal information, should you feel it appropriate to do so.

What Happened? On May 29, 2022, the City learned of suspicious activity involving a user's network account credential. The City quickly began to investigate this report and worked with third party forensic specialists to review City systems to determine the full nature and scope of this event. On August 4, 2022, the City learned that certain files may have been copied and taken from the City's network. Following this discovery, we undertook a comprehensive review of the information potentially at issue. On September 12, this review concluded, and it was determined that the information at issue included your personal information.

What Information Was Involved? The information related to you that may have been involved includes your name [Extra 2 - data elements]. Please note that we have no evidence that your personal information was subject to misuse as a result of this event.

What We Are Doing. We treat the security of information in our possession as an utmost priority and apologize for any inconvenience this event may cause. As part of our ongoing commitment to the security of information within our care, we are reviewing our existing policies and procedures regarding cybersecurity and evaluating additional measures and safeguards to protect against this type of event in the future.

What You Can Do. We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account and monitoring your free credit reports for suspicious activity. You may also review the information contained in the attached *Steps You Can Take to Protect Personal Information*. Although we are not aware of any actual or attempted misuse of your personal information, as an added precaution, we have arranged to offer you access to [Extra3] months of complimentary credit monitoring and identity restoration services provided through Experian. Although we are making these services available to you, we are unable to enroll you directly. For enrollment instructions, please review the information contained in the attached *Steps You Can Take to Protect Personal Information*.

### **Monitor Your Accounts**

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. You may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of your credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended "fraud alert" on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer's credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer's credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer's identity before extending new credit. If you are a victim of identity theft, you are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should you wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any one of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a "credit freeze" on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer's express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in your name without your consent. However, you should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in your credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application you make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, you cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on your credit report. To request a security freeze, you will need to provide the following information:

- 1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
- 2. Social Security number;
- 3. Date of birth;
- 4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
- 5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
- 6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver's license or ID card, etc.); and
- 7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if you are a victim of identity theft.
