By providing this notice, RoadSafe Traffic Systems, Inc. ("RoadSafe") does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Maine law, the applicability of the Maine data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

On April 10, 2023, RoadSafe identified suspicious activity related to certain systems within its computer network. RoadSafe promptly took steps to respond, including isolating the affected machines, disconnecting its network from the internet, and commencing a thorough investigation into the full nature and scope of the activity. Although the investigation is ongoing, RoadSafe determined that the suspicious activity resulted in unauthorized access to its network. Therefore, RoadSafe initiated a review of its systems to determine the type of information potentially at risk, and to whom it related. The initial review determined that the information potentially at risk includes name, Social Security number, and financial account information.

Notice to Maine Residents

Although the nature and extent of the unauthorized access remain under investigation, in an abundance of caution, on May 5, 2023, RoadSafe began providing written notice of this incident to four (4) Maine residents. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as *Exhibit A*.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the event, RoadSafe moved quickly to investigate and respond to the incident, assess the security of its systems, and identify potentially affected individuals. RoadSafe also notified federal law enforcement regarding the event. RoadSafe is evaluating its policies and procedures and working to implement additional measures to further safeguard information on its network. Further, out of an abundance of caution, RoadSafe is providing access to credit monitoring services for two (2) years, through Experian, to individuals whose personal information was potentially affected by this incident, at no cost to these individuals.

Additionally, RoadSafe is providing impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud, including providing individuals with information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one's credit file, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud.

RoadSafe is also providing written notice of this incident to relevant state regulators, as necessary, and to the three major credit reporting agencies, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion.

What Happened? On April 10, 2023, RoadSafe identified suspicious activity related to certain systems within our computer network. We promptly took steps to respond, including isolating the affected machines, disconnecting our network from the internet, and commencing a thorough investigation into the full nature and scope of the activity. Although the investigation is still ongoing, we have determined that there was unauthorized access to the RoadSafe network. Therefore, RoadSafe initiated a review of its systems to determine the type of information potentially at risk, and to whom it related. Following its initial review, RoadSafe worked diligently to identify address information for any potentially affected individuals. Although the nature and extent of the unauthorized access, including whether it impacts you, remain under investigation, in an abundance of caution, we are notifying you about the event before the investigation is complete so that you may take steps to protect your information.

What Information Was Involved? The information related to you potentially impacted as a result of this event may include your name, Social Security number, and financial account information.

What We Are Doing. Information security is one of RoadSafe's highest priorities, and we have security measures in place to protect information in our care. We responded promptly when we discovered this event by taking steps to secure our systems and commence a comprehensive investigation. We are also reviewing and enhancing existing policies and procedures and implementing additional safeguards to further secure the information in our systems. We also reported this incident to federal law enforcement.

Although we do not have any evidence of misuse of information, as an added precaution, RoadSafe is offering you access to twenty-four (24) months of credit monitoring and identity protection services at no cost to you. You will find information on how to enroll in these services in the "Steps You Can Take To Help Protect Information" section of this letter. We encourage you to enroll in these services as we are not able to do so on your behalf.

What You Can Do. We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements and monitoring your free credit reports for suspicious activity and to detect errors. Please also review the information contained in the "Steps You Can Take To Help Protect Information" section of this letter.

- 6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver's license or ID card, etc.); and
- 7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if you are a victim of identity theft.
