Highlights - Employee Health & Wellness - <i>Shonna Poulin- Gutierrez</i>	 Information contained in written reports; highlights and discussion noted below: <u>HMS Audit:</u> The response rate of the dependent audit was 95.81% of employees successfully completed the verification. HMS processed 14,217 documents through February 5, 2021. Of the documents received 81% were received through uploads. <u>Anthem:</u> As voted on in the February meeting, Anthem was provided notification to extend coverage for members diagnosed with COVID- 	



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	 19, for no out-of-pocket costs from in-network doctors, hospitals and other healthcare professionals through March 31, 2021. Naturally Slim: Open enrollment for Naturally Slim was held from February 22nd – March 5th, over 800 eligible members will start Naturally Slim in March. Express Scripts: Covid-19 vaccine utilization as of 3/10/2021, is 461 members. Pharmacy RFP: On February 23, 2021 a notice of conditional award was sent out to all bidders to indicate that MedImpact Healthcare Systems, Inc. received the evaluation team's highest ranking Committees: Second appeal meetings were held on March 4, 2021 and March 8, 2021. A Plan Design meeting was held on Feb. 22, 2021. Lockton is compiling additional data for the next scheduled meeting on April 6, 2021.

U.S. Healthcare Landscape - Peter Hayes	 Information contained in written report; highlights and discussion noted below: Prices, Not Utilization, Driving Costs: Between 2014-2018, per capita healthcare spending among those with employer-sponsored plans grew an average of 4.3% annually- more than 25% higher than per capita GDP Spending on Health Care Crowds Out Other Priorities: "Twenty years of wage stagnation on the middle class has been 95% caused by exploding healthcare costs." Value = Cost and Quality: High value care must be both affordable and high quality. Many studies of the U.S. healthcare system have found significant variation in quality and that poor-quality results in negative outcomes and higher costs. National and SEHC Strategies to Promote Healthcare Value: Accountable Care Organizations (ACOs), Bundled payments, Centers of Excellence (CoEs), Claims audits, Disease/chronic condition managements, Eligibility audits, Second opinion programs, Tiered networks Other National Strategies: Advanced primary care & onsite/near-site clinics, MSK, Narrow networks, Reference-based pricing, Shopping tools, Transparent/pass-through PBMs, Virtual care Maine Healthcare Landscape: Maine has 33 hospitals; 64 percent are owned by larger health systems Total Spending Trends: The State's medical costs declined in 2017, remained stable in 2018, and then rebounded 5.4% in 2019 Rising Pharmacy Costs: The State's pharmacy allowed PMPM has increased at an average annual rate of 5.0% Member Cost Sharing Trends: Member cost sharing for medical services increased in 2017 in response to higher deductibles and larger copays for primary care & specialist visits Impact of Chronic Conditions: Members with chronic conditions account for 38.8% of the State Employee population and 62.0% of total spend 	Heather Perreault asks if we could have a comparison between increased premiums and total employee spend? Lisa Nolen says yes she will work with Lockton and follow up.

Approximately 500 names on the final report for removal. This was just a snapshot in time. Some were voluntary terms, some terminated, some retired. EH&W has received approximately 120 appeals. On track for review for removal of voluntary terms to be removed as of April 1st. EH&W is doing everything possible to assist employees in completing the audit. Jonathan French asks is the EH&W office still allowing employees to submit appeals and documentation? Shonna Poulin-Gutierrez answers yes, HR and EH&W are still working with employees to have the audit completed. Cecile Champagne-Thompson asks what the timing of EH&W is to notify Anthem for the first April bill, Shonna Poulin-Gutierrez answer that EH&W is looking to have those processed through Anthem by next week.
