If using additional sheets, please be sure to key your answers to the appropriate question(s).

To facilitate MFS review, please avoid lumping responses to multiple/different questions into a single paragraph or narrative.

NOTE: If the requested variance area will exceed 5 acres or 500 feet of regulated shoreline, the variance information should describe conditions/prescriptions for any concurrent or planned harvesting within 1000 feet of the variance area, and any harvesting adjacent to or within the variance area within the past 10 years. Include these harvest areas on maps.

Submitting Petitions for MFS review:

Please send variance petitions to MFS's Augusta office (address above). Petitions will be forwarded to the appropriate MFS Regional Enforcement Coordinator for review.

Variances may be submitted anytime. However, please allow 30-60 days for processing of most requests.

The Burden of Proof rests with the landowner to demonstrate the need for the variance. The more information and evidence provided with the petition, the better the MFS can act on your request.

<u>Please note</u> that incomplete or unsigned variance petitions will be denied.

MFS staff will schedule a site visit at their discretion.

Variance requests for <u>winter operations</u> that are submitted after October 1st may be delayed until ground conditions allow MFS field review free of snow-cover.

Variances may be issued only for standards as set forth in MFS rules. If a variance is issued, the landowner must still comply with all other applicable state and federal regulations as well as municipal ordinances.

 - \circ acres affected,
 - stand type, estimated age/age structure
 - o species, basal area (total and by major species),
 - o stand structure and stocking data (including dbh average and range)
 - condition of trees by species (insect and disease, decay, growth, windfirmness including LCR (live crown ratio) and h/d (height to diameter ratio); if appropriate, describe quality of growing stock and/or quantify current/ongoing mortality <u>by species</u>)
 - existing regeneration
- □ Silvicultural justification for the harvest (identify based on regeneration/stand improvement measures within a silvicultural system).
- **D** Expected post-harvest stand conditions
 - o acres affected (if different),
 - o residual species, basal area (total and by major species),
 - stand structure and stocking data (incl dbh average and range)
 - condition of trees by species (insect and disease, decay, growth, windfirmness incl LCR and h/d ratio)
 - residual regeneration (how will existing regeneration be protected, how much will survive the harvest? if limited/none, explain how regeneration will be assured. How will regeneration meet the criterion of "well-distributed"?)
- □ Soils information). Include specific relevant characteristics such as soil texture/type (dry, wet, ledge, clay, silt, sand, etc.), rooting depth, depth to bedrock/parent material, depth to water table, rutting/erosion risk, windthrow risk. For areas >5 acres, provide a site-specific soil survey report available from USGS WebSoilSurvey; note any local/site-specific discrepancies from published information.
- **D** Terrain (steep, flat, erosion potential), slopes in variance area.
- □ Harvest techniques and type of equipment (felling/yarding, construction) to be

utilized; season of operation; location of log landings/roads serving the immediate variance area.

Best Management Practices to be installed (before, during and after the harvest),

- o Identify all water bodies/wetlands and practices used to protect them,
- Effects on wildlife and fisheries habitat, and on identified natural communities. Identify any specific habitat management agreements/constraints in the variance area. Provide relevant information from Beginning with Habitat or similar information from Maine Natural Areas Program and/or Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife.
- □ If in an unorganized town/township, identify all applicable LUPC subdistrict(s).
- Skid trails, land management roads, and crossings of water bodies:
 - Provide sufficient design information pre- and post-installation to determine how the proposed activities will adhere to or deviate from standards.
- □ Identify any other permits that are required.

6. Cause of the issue, if any. Variances will not be issued if conditions claimed as grounds for the variance were created by the owner or a predecessor in title. The map should explicitly correspond to and support other elements of this petition. In some instances, you may have a forest management plan that will have a map that will supply most, if not all the detail required for this section.
