



Key to Identifying Common Household Ants


This key includes nine of the most common ant species that are most likely to be a nuisance around California homes and structures. Many other ant species occur in California, but most are not home invaders.





One-node Ants

	Go to step 5










brown; circle of hairs present on the tip of the abdomen (Fig. 5)


Carpenter ant




Velvety tree ant

3A. Large, up to 1/2 inch long; black or reddish to dark











Key to Identifying Common Household Ants (continued) Two-node Ants
