However, the application requests 40 hours per week year-round- and so why does the narrative state "applies increased sales revenue to pay the remainder of these salaries in 2024"? The application states: "2021 SCBGP funds designated for MFC employee payroll will be spent by July 2023; the MFC will cover the remainder of [2023] employee payroll using revenue generated from online sales and membership fees. The MFC is requesting further funds to be applied to payroll in 2024, as it rebuilds its reserves and applies increased sales revenue to pay the remainder of these salaries in 2024."

"Air-spore" focuses on Early and Late blight, and "Spornado" focuses only upon Late blight, and would be complimentary and confirmatory of "Air-spore" findings. Air-spore relies upon visual microscopy of collected sample slides to identify and report spore numbers to customers. Spornado relies upon molecular diagnostics using qPCR to estimate presence and quantity of spores in collected samples. Owing to the destructiveness of late blight, and it's associated costs to the industry, it is best to have a two-system process for confirmation of its presence. False positive detection and false negative detection will likely have a multi-million-dollar impact to the industry, with the former owing to increases in fungicide application frequency and shift towards more expensive targeted products, and the latter due to direct disease impacts to the crop.

The above paragraph was repeated 3 times in the proposal, so what???? What about these two systems and how do they relate to this project?
