Take the Lewiston Middle School model and place it in the Portland Middle School. This would take 5 students in each group 2 times per week with 6-12 students added each year. They would coordinate efforts with school administration and staff, as well as providing in service training session to the teachers.

Both MIO alumni and school professionals indicate that keeping Middle School youth away from contact with the youth justice system will improve the outcomes for the youth. This program will work with students with attendance and behavioral issues inside of school in hopes of providing alternative to them. This program has also shown to deepen a youth's feeing of connectedness to their communities.

3 What positive outcomes do you see for youth by engaging in this program?

This program has helped shape student's behavior so that they have improved school attendance, have fewer behavioral problems and are finding success with their schools. By the youth having a safe place to discuss and explore negative events at school, they help the youth develop better decision making and emotional controls to avoid these events in the future. By engaging youth in creating original theater that helps the youth explore hard topics (systemic racism; power imbalance with teachers; truancy; negative behaviors in the classroom) and develop youth leadership skills, decision making skills, social emotional control to engage in building stronger peer relationships. Through this work it is anticipated that youth will have fewer suspensions, expulsions, or behavioral referrals from school, have less unsupervised free time and will develop positive feelings towards schools, administrators and teacher and perform better overall.

By addressing suspension and misbehavior the hope is to avoid local law enforcement officers and not have citations reach the youth justice system.
