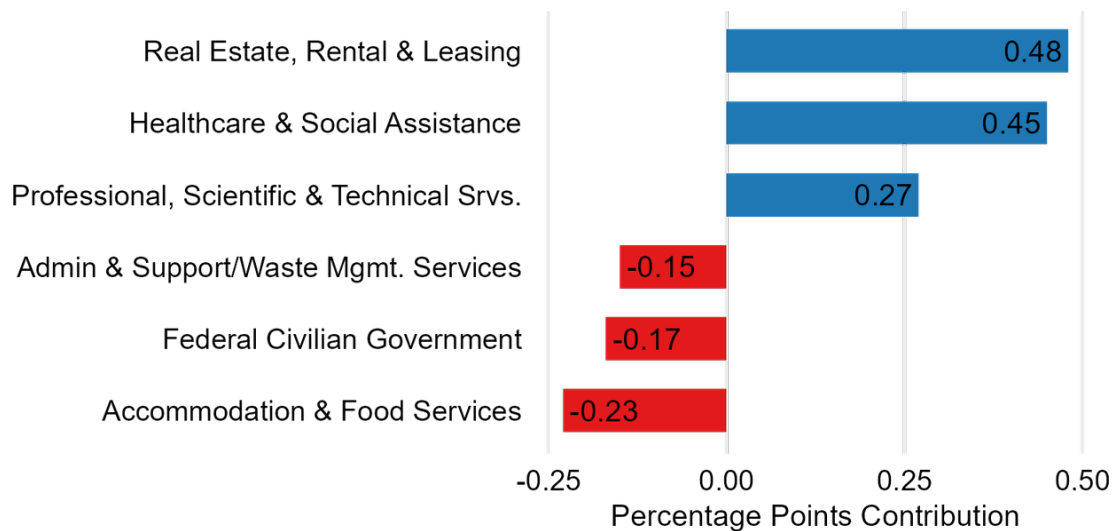


2025 Annual Gross Domestic Product (GDP) and Personal Income (PI)

Maine's Economic Performance in 2025 as measured by GDP and PI

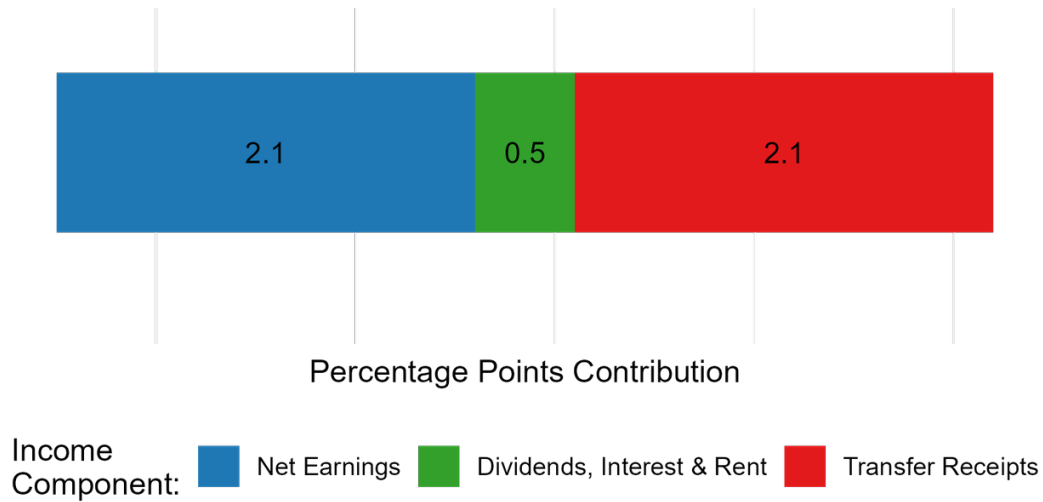
Maine's **real GDP** grew by **0.6%**. This placed the state **47th in the U.S.**, below the national average (**2.1%**), and **last in New England** (2.2%), where growth ranged from 2.4% in Massachusetts and 1.1% in Rhode Island. The strongest contributors to GDP growth were **real estate and rental and leasing, healthcare and social assistance, and professional, scientific, and technical services**. However, small declines in other industries including **accommodation and food services, federal civilian government, and administrative and support and waste management and remediation services** partially offset these gains.

Top and Bottom Contributing Industries to Maine's GDP Growth (2025)



Personal income in Maine grew to **\$101.4 billion** in 2025 – a **4.7% increase** over the previous year. The state ranked **29th for growth in the U.S. (4.9%)** and **3rd in New England (4.5%)**, behind New Hampshire and Rhode Island. **Net earnings** – which reflect wages, salaries, and business income and contributes to personal income – grew by **3.7%** in 2025, below growth in the **U.S. (4.7%)** and **New England (4.3%)**. Additional contributions came from **dividends, interest, and rent (2.5% growth)** and **transfer receipts (9.2% growth)**, which includes government benefits like Social Security and unemployment assistance. The figure below highlights contributions to Maine's total personal income growth by component.

Certain industries played a role in boosting earnings, with **healthcare and social assistance, state and local government, management of companies and enterprises, and wholesale trade** contributing the most to personal income growth.

Top Contributing Industries to Maine's Personal Income Growth (2025)



Maine's **per capita personal income** rose to **\$71,662**, marking a **4.2% increase** from 2024. While this placed Maine **27th in the country**, per capita income remained the **lowest in New England**, where the regional average stands at **\$91,818** (highest nationwide), with **Connecticut ranking 1st** in the country, **Massachusetts ranking 2nd**, and **New Hampshire ranking 8th**.

Indicator Definitions and Importance

What is Gross Domestic Product (GDP), and Why Does It Matter?

GDP measures the total value of all goods and services produced in the economy over a set period, usually a year or a quarter. It is a key measure of economic activity, showing whether the economy is growing or shrinking. A rising GDP typically signals economic expansion, while a decline may indicate a slowdown or recession.

What is Personal Income (PI), and Why Does It Matter?

Personal income measures the income that all individuals in a region get from various sources including wages, salaries, government benefits such as Social Security, investments, and business profits. It serves as a key indicator of financial well-being and purchasing power. Trends in personal income can signal shifts in economic conditions, influencing consumer spending and overall economic performance.

About the Data

The U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) releases preliminary estimates of GDP and personal income by state on a quarterly and annual basis. Additional detail is provided by industry sector to show the contribution of each industry to the overall change in Maine's GDP and total personal income. Annual data for the previous calendar year is typically released in March, with revisions released in September.
