To Whom It May Concern:

I am writing to urge your opposition and denial to the proposed CMP Corridor Project.

I watched a couple sessions of hearings held at UMF. I'm not sure if this was your department's hearing or not. But regardless, I heard several people testify who have first hand knowledge of the area in northwest Maine which will experience the construction of the new section of powerline. These people know the impact the corridor will have on wildlife in general. They were able to testify as to how it will affect specific species. When "cross-examined" by CMP's lawyers or supposed experts, these people were almost ridiculed by people who have no practical knowledge of how a winter deer yard works or the type and amount of vegetation protection a trout stream needs. One lawyer asked if a deer can cross a powerline. Well, of course it can but not so easily in the winter and perhaps when being pursued by coyotes. They didn't seem to grasp the concept of a deer yard and how the size of one is a major protecting factor for the deer. One lawyer has a wildlife admit that the coyote population is declining. A true expert knows animal populations grow and recede in cycles. I could go on with other examples but I think my point is clear. The testimony of on-the-ground and experienced experts needs to be appreciated.

CMP talks about how this corridor will help the environment. One argument is that we are at the end of the environmental pipeline so to speak when it comes to air quality. Perhaps it will help someone but the statement suggests it will help Maine. The large forest that this area is part of does more to help the global air quality than any supposed benefit CMP and invented.

CMP talks about the fact that these forests have been logged for generations. I agree that clear cuts are ugly and are usually replanted plantation style. But the fact is the cuttings grow back and benefit some type of wildlife as they mature. It's not a perfect system but the results are not permanent. The Corridor is permanent.

CMP's record is less than unblemished. It has been unfair to customers with overcharging issues. Two neighboring New England states did not accept this project. But Maine is on the verge of accepting it and accepting the destruction of its unique environment. CMP's commercial are misleading and the company is guided by money. Former Governor Paul LePage has admitted he took money for his support of this project. I do not think Maine should allow such a company to destroy a section of a unique and environmentally important part of the state and world.

CMP uses the legal system to block and delay opposition. Enough people signed the petition for a referendum. It figures CMP uses the law system to protect itself and its project on technicalities.

I visit the area of the new corridor construction to flyfish. I have stopped on a woods road and just sat and marvelled at beautiful vistas. I sit in my canoe on a favorite trout pond, Rock Pond, and look up at a beautiful mountain in one direction and woods in the other. For decades, I have caught and usually released wild trout that

were born and raised in the inlet and/or outlet of the pond. If this corridoris approved I will now sit and in one direction look up at that same beautiful mountain. But now when I look the other way I will be looking up at a massive powerline.

I hope when the department rules on the permit that the members will truly consider the protection of Maine's unique and treasured environment and the creatures which live in it.

Finally, I hesitate to say the following during the current health emergency. I have done a lot of self-reflecting and much hoping for the futire of this world and mankind. When and if this emergency passes, I know I will look at life much differently. I am autoimmuned compromised so I say these things with extreme concern. I find myself just hoping to be able to get back to Rock Pond, paddle out onto it, cast a fly, and look around at the eautiful wolderness. As a species, man needs to take care of this only place in the universe in which we know we can survive. Denying the CMP Corridor Project will be Maine's contribution to protecting one fragile part of this place in which we can live.

Why would we sacrifice the largest unfragmented forest east of the Mississippi, just to be someone else's extension cord? Secondly, this 154-mile corridor will tear through 53 miles of undeveloped Maine wilderness, putting 263 wetlands, 115 streams, 12 inland waterfowl habitats and a variety of native flora and fauna at risk. In addition to the unbuilt 53 miles of corridor, the existing lines will have to be expanded and replaced with powerlines fifty feet higher than the last. The use of pesticides to restrict the growth of Native vegetation would be disastrous for the landscape and its native species. Thirdly, the scar this corridor would leave on the Maine woods will turn away tourists and In-state landowners who take advantage of the sights and sounds of the state, draining the yearly income from the tourism industry. The North Maine woods are a last remaining holdout of untouched wilderness, both as a refuge for wildlife to thrive and for humans to take part in reciprocal conservation. This corridor would be a disaster for the wildlife in the area who depend on this land for survival, and the citizens of New England and the surrounding areas who come to Maine each year to take part in the rich history of the state's wilderness. CMP has constantly made false promises to their supporters in guaranteeing this promise of "clean power", by promoting the idea of reduced carbon emissions for the state. This claim, while true at face value, entirely overshadows the devastation this industrial corridor will have on wildlife in the region. What CMP fails to admit is that the best way to sequester carbon is through our forests, and this corridor would weaken our forest's ability to fight climate change. I respectfully ask that you not to grant permits to NECEC for this project, as it is in the best interest of the state of Maine to reject this corridor. This proposed corridor would affect the rich history of the Maine woods, including hunting, fishing, and backpacking, and will permanently scar this last remaining holdout of wilderness in the Northeast.

I am opposed to Central Maine Power's transmission project for the following reasons:

- It will environmentally damage a unique part of the country:

Unbroken forest lands, without human sprawl, are extremely important to the native animals and plants that live there. The building of a power line in this area will disturb the balance and enable non-native plants to establish themselves in areas they have not yet gained a foothold. We already know how difficult it is to eradicate invasives! Maine DEP needs to realize that this project does not benefit Maine's environment.

- Massachusetts benefits from the Hydro Power, not Maine:
