One of the amazing realities of the United States of America is the diversity of people and geographies represented. Last year I had the privilege to be in Ohio for a conference, and had my first opportunity to utilize an Electric Vehicle. To state it clearly, the experience was more than exasperating. Even states and metropolitan areas that you would assume would be well equipped to handle the charging needs of EV's were whoafully lacking. In this personally brief experience, I visited 5 charging stations listed on the mapping program. And while I found the charging stations, they were either proprietary (only working with/for certain vehicle brands) or so slow at charging, I would have missed my return flight to Maine.
