**Question or Comment** 

I am writing with a serious concern about the proposed requirements imposing sales quotas on EVs over the next decade. Maine is NOT California and if the Board makes decisions to force the sales of EVs, we will again be sold down the river of unresponsive government making decisions about our lives. First, the market for EVs needs to develop and attract the
