Hello, I'm a born Mainer, promoter of green options and electrician by trade. Maines grid is struggling so badly that it only takes a small thunder storm to shut power down to some cities and towns for days. Why would we want to further overload and cause millions of dollars worth of problems to our grid, which we the consumer will pay for, to promote an unreasonable regulation based on an unproven scientific hypothesis that converting every vehicle to electric or hybrid will solve the "global warming issue"? If we are all so concerned about the carbon footprint that we produce then why are we trying to find solutions for a state (which has the highest forest density of any other state at 89.46%) that produces only 13.5 million metric tons of Co2 per year on average when there are roughly 5,500 bulk carrier ships in the world emitting over 440 million metric tons of Co2 per year? If that doesn't concern you; how about the ONE BILLION metric tons of Co2 released from commercial airlines PER YEAR.
