Chair Lessard and respective members of the Maine Bureau of Environmental Protection,

My name is Brad Farrin. I reside in the Town of Norridgewock and proudly serve the people of Senate District 3 in the Maine State Legislature, representing the communities of Benton, Canaan, Clinton, Detroit, Dixmont, Etna, Madison, Newport, Norridgewock, Palmyra, Pittsfield, Plymouth, Skowhegan, Stetson, and Unity Township,

I am here today to provide comments on the rulemaking for Chapter 128, Advanced Clean Trucks Program. I will be brief in my remarks as my concerns reflect those presented in detail to you by the "Mainers for Smart Energy" coalition. I have followed the work of the coalition and believe the group's perspective on this matter closely aligns with my own.

In addition to my role in the Legislature, I work for a heavy equipment dealership, which services customers across the state and across industries. I am troubled by this initiative due to my experience with our customers, coupled with my knowledge of industry and the numerous conversations I have had with constituents. I understand and respect the proponents' interest in reducing greenhouse gases and air pollutants from vehicles. However, putting such a burden on industries that are already heavily regulated and historically and routinely have added so much value to Maine's economic landscape in such a rushed manner, seems impractical and not well planned.

I have a number of questions and concerns:

• The cost of advancing these mandates, both on government and impacted industries;

• The unanswered questions about grid capacity and the State's ability to guarantee enough reliable electricity to comply with the mandates associated with the standards proposed in this rule;

• The safety concerns with regards to battery malfunctions and related issues; and

• The availability of product and access to equipment servicing and repairs.

These concerns should be enough evidence to warrant a much more in-depth study. My concern if we don't slow this process down, we may very well unnecessarily create a host of unintended consequences.

Thank you for your consideration of our perspectives on this matter. I will submit these comments in written form to the bureau contact as well for the record.
