National Influenza Vaccination Week

National Influenza Vaccination Week (NIVW) is a national observance that was established to highlight the importance of continuing

influenza vaccination. NIVW 2015 was observed **December** 6-12, 2015.



In the United

States, flu activity is *usually* highest between December and February and can last as late as May. With family and friends gathering for the holidays, now is a great time to promote vaccination to patients. The Maine Immunization Program still has vaccine available at the distribution center that can be utilized for any children that have not been immunized. Providers may also want to consider using the reminder recall system for all children associated in their practice to encourage vaccination.

The Advisory Committee for Immunization Practices recently updated the recommendations regarding the interval between PCV13 followed by PPSV23 from 6–12 months to ≥1 year for immunocompetent adults aged ≥65 years.

Meningococcal B Vaccine

Trumenba and Bexsero Meningococcal B vaccines are now available on ImmPact for providers to order.

The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recently recommended that clinicians may choose to administer serogroup B meningococcal vaccine to children 10 through 18 years at increased risk for meningococcal disease attributable to serogroup B, including:

- Children who have persistant complement component deficiencies
- Children taking a drug called eculizumab (also called Soliris®)
- Chlidren who have anatomic or functional asplenia, including sickle cell disease
- Children identified to be at increased risk because of a meningococcal disease outbreak attributable to serogroup B
- Children aged 16 through 18 years without high risk conditions may also be vaccinated.

On July 16, 2013, the Immunization Action Coalition (IAC) launched the Hepatitis B Birth Dose Honor Roll. The Honor Roll recognizes hospitals and birthing centers that have achieved over 90% coverage rates for administering hepatitis B vaccine at birth and have written policies and procedures to protect babies from hepatitis B infection. At this time, 217 birthing facilities nationwide have been accepted into the Honor Roll, 13 of these are Maine Hospitals.
