## **CESAREAN SECTIONS**

MAINE VITAL STATISTICS SYSTEM: 1993 - 2002 (preliminary)

In 2002, 13,549 babies were born to Maine residents. More than 3,500 of these babies were delivered by cesarean section (c-section) - 1 of every 4 births - a rate similar to what was experienced nationally. This was the highest c-section rate ever reported in Maine, and the highest rate ever reported nationally.

For the 1st half of the 10 year period, 1993 - 2002, c-section rates were relatively stable at about 21% of all deliveries; however, in 1999, rates started rising and continued to rise through 2002 to reach 26%.



- Contributing to this increase was a sharp decline in the number of women who delivered babies vaginally after having a previous csection; this went from 2.9% of births in 1993 to 1.2% of births in 2002. Another contributing factor was a 7% increase in the incidence of primary c-section deliveries.
- While the number of births to Maine resident women decreased by 10% between 1993 and 2002, the number of c-sections increased by 11%. Also, during that period, vaginal deliveries to women who previously had c-sections declined to nearly 1/3 of what was reported in 1993.
