PERSONS AUTHORIZED TO SOLEMNIZE MARRIAGES IN MAINE

Maine law, 19-A MRS §655 specifies persons authorized to solemnize marriages in Maine. The following persons are authorized to solemnize marriages in Maine:

If a resident of this State:

- \checkmark A justice or judge;
- \checkmark A lawyer admitted to the Maine Bar; or
- ✓ A marriage officiant under <u>Title 5, section 90-G</u>;

Whether a resident or nonresident of this State and whether or not a citizen of the United States:

- \checkmark An ordained minister of the gospel;
- \checkmark A cleric engaged in the service of the religious body to which the cleric belongs; or
- ✓ A person licensed to preach by an association of ministers, religious seminary, or ecclesiastical body; and
- ✓ A nonresident of the State who has a temporary registration certificate issued by the Office of Data, Research, and Vital Statistics.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS (FAQ's)

1. How do I find a marriage officiant in Maine?

An online search may be made for a marriage officiant who is licensed in the State of Maine on the Secretary of State's website at <u>https://www.maine.gov/sos/cec/notary/marriage/marriageofficiant.html</u>.

2. Can a person become ordained through an online process?

Yes, a person ordained through an online process is still a minister, at least for the purpose of marrying a couple in the State of Maine.

3. Can a nonresident who is authorized to perform a marriage in their State perform a marriage in Maine?

Yes, a nonresident may apply for a one-time temporary registration certificate to perform a marriage in Maine.
