Mainspring is a collaborative effort spearheaded by Fairtide (affordable housing and thrift store) and Footprints (food pantry) to be a 1-stop-shop for social services and support to reduce barriers to access. 


WHAT IS PREVENTION?

Prevention activities work to educate and support individuals and communities to prevent the use and misuse of drugs and the development of substance use disorders.

PROGRAM GOALS

- 1. Prevent the initiation of substance use and high-risk substance use by implementing primary prevention strategies across the lifespan.
- 2. Reduce incidence of Substance Use Disorder (SUD) and drug related overdose deaths by implementing secondary prevention strategies (including harm reduction).
- 3. Establish and strengthen collaboration among communities, public and private nonprofit agencies, and federal, state, and local governments to support the efforts of substance use prevention.
- 4. Identify and address substance use-related health disparities in Maine's high-priority populations.

- Safe storage promotion for ulletcannabis, prescription and non-prescription medications.
- **R**esponsible **B**everage Server/seller (RBS) training for alcohol retailers.
- Promote Drug Take Back Days in October and April.

Keep kids and pets safe.

AFE STORAGE TIPS

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ENGAGING YOUTH IN SCHOOLS

- Restorative practices helping youth stay in school to receive education and support, not suspended out for substance use issues.
- Support for schools to implement evidence-based substance use prevention education and curriculum in Middle Schools.
- Helping schools promote youth mattering initiatives
- Engaging youth in substance-free activities.
- OUT Maine inclusivity trainings for school staff on best practices to support LGBTQ+ students.





PREVENTION AT HOME & IN THE COMMUNITY

- Conduct Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACES) training for parents and community.
- Collaborate with the York District Public Health Council, local coalitions, and community organizations to engage decision makers and community members.
- Promoting mental health supports and resources in newsletters, websites, printed materials, and at coalition events.





HARM REDUCTION & OVERDOSE PREVENTION

- Overdose prevention education, Naloxone administration trainings, and dissemination.
- Promote OPTIONS program an initiative to support treatment, harm reduction and recovery
- Partnering with treatment and recovery centers and communities.

NALOXONE

HOW TO USE NALOXONE NASAL SPRAY

Naloxone is a lifesaving medication that can reverse an opioid overdose. Carrying naloxone can help you save a life if you see a possible overdose.



Call 9-1-1 then carefully remove naloxone from packaging.





Hold the nasal spray with your thumb on the plunger and **place the tip of the nasal spray in either nostril of the person experiencing an overdose** until fingers are touching their nose.





Firmly press the plunger to release the entire dose of medication into the nose.





Wait 2-3 minutes for the person to respond. If no response, give additional doses, switching nostrils, until help arrives.

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


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
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
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
