Spoke to the NIMS national incident management system, training 100 and 700/common language to be used. <u>https://training.fema.gov/nims/</u> Bringing in the ambulances in from one direction. Hospitals are the better examples of whom they work with. Discussed strategy in Lewiston and things learned from it. Spoke to implementation plan for future. After Action Report, every structure fire, or any major incident. These reports include "lessons that were learned," what when well, what needs improvement. Patty Hamilton spoke to reaching out to other community organizations and looking at weather, i.e. coast guard breaking the ice to avoid flooding. A great deal of this is building on relationships. Tree crews, Versant Power, examples. Use a priority list. Schools are very high on the priority list (winter) while in the summer not. Be sure to contact the power company as they are going where there highest amount of out outages/or high priority list. The power companies have been receptive to local municipalities helping support outages. Is there a list of people whom have special needs, i.e. Cpap machines, etc. These lists are changing all the time.

9:35 – 10:00am (25 mins) Deb Hamlin, Deputy Director E-911 Addressing Officer & Jaeme Duggan, Director EMA from Piscataquis County Emergency Management Agency will present on how emergency preparedness planning for rural and remote regions differs from large city planning.

Contrast between Emergency planning for urban and rural. One full time fire-fighter in the entire county. We do have some per diem staff. One to two ambulances available. Political compliant is also different. Utilizing mutual aide through activating. Some situations requiring being on foot, when cellphones are not working, or radios are available. Updating state level employees required to have the basic NIMS courses. Using plain language. Need a radio system. The unhouses population looks very different in Piscataquis County, they are living in tents, cars, RV's. Peer support police, fire, EMS, jail... started two years ago. Culture of the Piscataquis County. Phone, zoom, message, email with firefighters to other fire fighters.

When an emergency happens, it too often requires transportation which isn't readily available, and communications - which due to broadband access and utility - varies greatly and covers

many modes. The most frequent one used up here is word of mouth which makes it difficult to ensure consistency and accuracy.

Annex will be available to the public. Signed off by the commissioners. Template of warming and cooling centers sent out. There is no public transportation. Very far between resources.

Is there a role for us to advocate for funding as a public health district. It would be Helping Hands and the Highlands Response Group. Managed to house 16 people, 5 or 6 households.
