NHSC Loan Repayment Programs Accepting Applications!

The National Health Service Corps (NHSC) Loan Repayment Programs are open now! The application cycle is open through May 1, 2025 at 7:30 PM ET.

The Rural Medical Access Program Accepting Applications Now!

The Rural Medical Access Program (RMAP) is accepting applications now through May 5, 2025 at 4:00 PM. The RMAP program promotes obstetrical and prenatal care in federally designated Medically Underserved Areas/Populations and Primary Care Health Professional Shortage Areas of Maine through assistance with insurance premiums for eligible obstetricians and family or general practice physicians.

To be eligible, the physicians must be practicing in Maine, have performed deliveries and/or provided prenatal care and have malpractice insurance for prenatal care and/or obstetrical services, all for at least the period of July 1, 2024—December 31, 2024.



Utilizing Motivational Interviewing in Rural Hospitals

The RHPCP in collaboration with the Health Education & Training Institute (HETIMaine) are announcing an educational program to help Critical Access Hospitals (CAHs) improve the health of patients with chronic illnesses that can also improve staff retention.

‘Using Motivational Interviewing (MI) in Rural Hospitals’ is a free educational series that will be offered in May 2025 through the Medicare Rural Hospital Flexibility Program (HRSA Award # 2 U2WR33288). Participating trainees will learn simple language and processes that can be used in any clinical location. MI offers a different way to talk to patients with chronic illnesses and implementation requires no program expense.

The training series will be held virtually on Zoom and taught by Stephen Andrew, CEO, HETI. The training is a total of 12 hours and the dates and times are listed below:

Reducing Hospital Acquired Infections through Oral Health Interventions

Nicole Breton, Director, Rural Health and Primary Care, and Kate Christiansen, Health Program Manager, Maine Oral Health Program have been travelling to a few selected Critical Access Hospitals in a pilot project to train hospitals in decreasing their Hospital Acquired Infections.

The training describes the rationale for integrating oral health into overall health, identify nursing and oral health care interventions to assist patients in maintaining optimum oral health status and preventing Non-Ventilated Hospital Acquired Pneumonia and describes the economic and quality effects that not caring for a patient's oral health can lead to.

Upcoming Free ICD-11 Training

The RHPCP in association with Stroudwater Associates are presenting 'The Importance of Coding Specificity: Strengthening your Organization today for ICD-11 and Beyond'. This free training is sponsored through HRSA Grant # 2 H3HRH00027-22-00.

This training is geared towards Revenue Cycle/ Business Office Management, Coding professionals, Compliance Officers, IT/EMR Specialists, and Healthcare Administrators.

Some of the learning objectives of this training are listed below:


- Understand the impact of coding specificity on claim approvals and reimbursement

- Identify common denial trends related to nonspecific coding and documentation gaps
- Explore ICD-11's improvements in coding precision and how they compare to ICD-10
- Implement strategies today to enhance coding accuracy, provider documentation, and appeals processes in preparation for ICD-11
- Develop best practices to train and prepare coding teams for ICD-11 Implementation while improving current workflows.

New England Rural Data Analysis Dashboard

The Rural Analysis Dashboard was specifically developed to illustrate the health disparities between rural and urban areas in New England. This innovative mapping tool, which was developed by the New England Rural Health Association (NERHA) with funding from the six New England State Offices of Rural Health.



The dashboard offers access to nearly 200 rural health data elements across categories such as demographics, insurance status, maternity services, and more. There is also the ability to download data and generate PDF reports which makes it valuable to health care professionals, advocates, researchers, and students alike.

Workforce Outreach

Recently, the RHPCP has participated in multiple career fairs to promote the health care workforce.

The first of these events was on March 13th and 14th where the RHPCP together with Tallo attended the Skills USA State Tournament in Bangor. While there, we assisted students in enrolling on the Tallo platform so that they could interact with facilities in Maine and explore the many different career pathways for getting into the healthcare profession. We also provided information on different federal and state loan repayment programs and information on the 3RNET website where they can search for job opportunities in rural Maine in the future.

Secondly, on March 26th, staff of the RHPCP and staff of the Maine CDC Oral Health Program attended the University of Maine at Augusta Graduate Career Fair. While there, we provided information on the different Oral Health Professions that exist. We also provided information on different federal and state loan repayment programs and the 3RNET website.

Maine Health Access Foundation (MeHAF) Discretionary Grants Program

The discretionary Grants program provides small scale project-based funding for organizations to explore new or different approaches to their current work that strongly align with the goals of the Discretionary Grants Program and MeHAF's overall mission and goal areas.

Applicants must propose a specific project, either expanding upon work already being done or to more deeply explore a specific aspect of an organization's work, and it must be completed with tangible outcomes within one year.


