Free Asthma Self-Management Education Program



Who the Program is For

This free service is for adults or children (and their caregivers) living in Maine who are currently being treated for asthma, but still experiencing any of these issues:

- Needing to use a rescue inhaler more than twice in a week
- Waking up at night because of coughing or breathing issues
- Being unable to do activities they normally enjoy
- · Missing school or work
- Having to go to urgent care or the emergency room

Patients who develop self-management skills and receive medical care can improve the ability to control their asthma and maintain their quality of life¹.

About the Program

The Asthma Self-Management Education Program covers a range of topics over two or more visits held at locations convenient to patients and their caregivers—including homes, schools and places of work. This program follows the National Institute of Health Guidelines² for Asthma Self-Management Education, including:

- Establishing connection and obtaining baseline information
- · Delivering asthma education
- Providing medication assessment and reconciliation
- Creating Asthma Action Plans
- Educating on the dangers of tobacco use and secondhand smoke
- Developing asthma management and treatment goals
- Conducting home environmental and trigger reduction assessment

With proper authorization, Public Health Nurses can coordinate care between patients and their health care providers. This includes making sure a written Asthma Action Plan and visit outcomes notes are shared with patients and their providers.
