Each division is organized into a number of programs unique to the division's work.

Division of Public Health Systems

The Division of Public Health Systems' mission is to protect the health and lives of people in Maine by strengthening the ability of health agencies and partner organizations to detect, contain and manage public health threats and emergencies.

The Division consists of:

- 1. Data, Research and Vital Statistics
- 2. Maine Cancer Registry
- 3. Health and Environmental Testing Laboratory
- 4. Local Health Officers
- 5. Local Public Health Districts
- 6. Public Health Emergency Preparedness
- 7. Rural Health and Primary Care
- 8. Statewide Coordinating Council
- 9. Tribal Public Health

Public Health Districts

The Maine Legislature and the Maine Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) approved the creation of eight public health districts in 2008, based on population size, geographic boundaries (county borders), and hospital service areas. A Tribal Health District was established in 2011 in partnership with the five Maine Tribal jurisdictions, with limits determined by Tribal Health Centre service regions as well as tribal jurisdictional boundaries.

The Public Health Districts were established to enhance effective and efficient delivery of public health services by:

- Creating the geographic and local framework for greater consistency and equity in statewide delivery of all <u>10 Essential Public Health</u> <u>Services</u>.
- Providing a consistent basis for regional planning and coordination across the governmental, private (including business), public, and nonprofit sectors.
- Building sustainable infrastructure through regional co-location of Maine CDC and DHHS staff, and through an interactive, fully participatory District Coordinating Councils.

National Radon Action Month

Radon is an odorless and invisible radioactive gas released from rocks, soil and water. All outdoor and indoor air has some radon in it

Why does it matter?

 Radon can accumulate and get trapped in the air no matter how old or new



Maine's District 7 is the <u>Downeast Public Health</u>
<u>District</u> that covers Hancock and Washington
Counties. The Downeast Public Health District
consists of a Public Health Unit (includes Maine CDC
staff) located in the DHHS offices in Ellsworth,
Machias and Calais.

The coordination of the Downeast Public Health Unit is carried out by the District Public Health Liaison: Alfred May.

Each Public Health District has a Public Health
Council which is a representative, district-wide body
formed in partnership with the Maine Center for
Disease Control and Prevention (Maine CDC) to
engage in collaborative planning and decision-making
for the delivery of the 10 Essential Public Health
Services in the Public Health Districts.

Downeast Public Health Council (DEPHC)



The <u>Downeast Public Health Council</u> function is to mobilize working partnerships to coordinate efforts and resources within the District to produce results that no one community, organization, or sector could achieve effectively or efficiently alone.

With a mission to promote the health of all our communities by providing public health information, coordination, collaboration, and advocacy, the Downeast Public Health Council envisions the Downeast Maine communities as the healthiest in the state.

Responsibilities of the DEPHC:

- a house or building is, whether its basement is sealed or drafty.
- There is no safe threshold for radon levels, however the U.S. EPA, recommends fixing buildings with levels above 4 pCi/L.
- Radon is the second cause of lung cancer in the U.S.

Only 32.3% of adults are living in households tested for radon in Hancock county, while only 18.7% were tested for radon in Washington county which was significantly lower than the state's at 34.9%.

How to reduce radon risk?

- Testing your home and office for radon using a radon testing kit.
- 2. Send kit to approved laboratory.
- Fixing your home or notify your office building if radon levels are high.

How to keep radon levels low?

- Seal cracks in floors and walls with plaster or other materials.
- Cover the earth floor in crawl spaces with high density plastic sheet.
- Increase air flow in the house or building by opening windows and using fans and vents to circulate air.

The Maine Radiation Control
Program's Radon Section is
taking requests for a free
inspection of radon mitigation
systems that have been installed
by a state-registered mitigation
contractor or by a builder during
construction. The program also
registers radon service providers
including labs, contractors and
testing companies with a proven
level of training.

Cervical Cancer Awareness Month

Cervical cancer is a disease causing cervix cells to grow out of control, primarily caused by HPV infection. Early detection is highly treatable, resulting in long survival and improved quality of life for those affected.

- Identifying district public health issues and priorities using an assessment process:
- Coordinating and assuring public health services in our communities;
- · Addressing health disparities in the district;
- Convening non-traditional public health partners:
- Advising on public health policy and allocation of funding;
- Preparing and maintaining the public health system for public health accreditation.

The Council is composed of member organizations representing public health "sectors" that are described in the Council's bylaws and interested people within the District. Currently the DEPHC consists of members from 50 organizations representing public health sectors in the Downeast District.

Active council members are nominated and then elected annually to serve on the Council's Executive Committee. The Executive Committee guides and facilitates the Council's work.

Local Health Officers



Maine's Local Health Officers (or "LHOs") have a long and proud tradition of serving Maine's local communities, with a role established in 1885 by Maine Statute. LHOs are appointed by their municipality and serve locally and have an important role in the coordination between state and local public health.

What is the role of the LHOs?

The LHO's role and duties are outlined in <u>Title 22</u> <u>M.R.S.A. §454-A.</u> The LHO has five primary functions:

- 1. Overall health resource to the community;
- 2. Mediator-problem solver;
- 3. Investigator-Enforcer;

The rate of HPV-related cancer new cases in Hancock county was 17.5/100,000 population and in Washington county 21.7/100,000 population which are higher than the state's rate at 15.4/100,000 population (2019-2021)

73.9% of the population in Hancock county were up-to-date with their cervical cancer screenings, while 78.9% were up-to-date in Washington county both lower than the state rate of 82.0% (2018 & 2020).

How to protect?

HPV vaccine prevents new HPV infections from occurring. The vaccine is recommended for preteens but can be started as early as 9 years old through 26 years of age.

Maine "Start at 9" Campaign to prevent HPV cancers.

How to screen?

Cervical cancer risk can be lowered by getting screening regularly starting 21 years old.

- HPV test: looks for the virus that causes cervical cancer.
- Pap smear: looks for precancerous cell changes on the cervix.

The Maine Breast and Cervical Health Program (MBCHP) offers screening and diagnostic services to underserved women, public education, and community partnerships. It covers office visits, including Pap smear tests and high-risk HPV tests.

Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

Carbon monoxide (CO) is colorless, odorless, and poisonous; it can kill at any time. Every year, it causes thousands of people to become ill and claims hundreds of lives. The deadly gas is produced by a range of domestic appliances, including portable generators, charcoal grills, and furnaces that burn gas or oil.

How to recognize CO poisoning?

Headache

- Reporter to municipal leadership (Select Board, Manager) on community's public health status:
- 5. Reporter to Maine CDC on any perceived local public health threats.

Downeast District LHOs:

The Downeast Public Health District has 85 municipalities with 80 Local Health Officers. Alfred May, the Downeast Public Health District Liaison, is responsible for coordinating technical assistance and training of Local Health Officers. Heather Sneff is the statewide LHO Coordinator, providing expertise in training and building information supports through our website.

Types of complaints for LHOs:

- Drinking Water: well water contamination and community water system breakdowns.
- · Dangerous Buildings.
- Excess filth/garbage on properties.
- · Rodent/animal home invasion.
- · Unlawful dumping.
- Indoor living moisture/mold issues.
- · Landlord tenant Issues.
- · Dead animals.
- · Malfunctioning septic systems.

In Washington county 13 visits to the ED were due to CO poisoning while in Hancock county there were 9 visits in 2024.

How to lower CO poisoning

- Install, replace and check CO detectors.
- Maintain and service heating systems.
- Check and clean chimneys yearly.
- Operate power generators safely outdoors.
- Never run cars or trucks inside a garage.
- Have a mechanic check the exhaust system yearly.
