Maine Immunization Records Get easy access to your personal and family immunization records. Back to School Forms - Booster Shots - Travel



1. Download the free app Search "Docket" in the Apple App Store or Google Play Store - or, visit dockethealth.com.

2. Set-up your account Log in with your Apple or Google account, or create a Docket® account with your email address.

3. Search your records

You can access personal and family immunization records using Docket[®] if you have a valid phone number or email address on file with Maine's immunization registry (immPact). Your name, date of birth, and legal sex entered in Docket[®] must match your ImmPact record *exactly*.

For questions about your shots: consult with your care provider, pharmacist, or Maine CDC.

Use of Docket[®] is 100% optional.

What is the Maine Immunization Program?

Maine is a universal vaccine state, which means we provide vaccines to healthcare providers at no cost for children 0 through 18 years of age. Vaccine purchases are funded through the federal Vaccines for Children program, fees assessed on health insurers who cover Maine lives and 317 immunization program federal funding.



How Much Will I Have to Pay?

All children regardless of insurance status are eligible to receive vaccine at no cost. Your doctor's office may charge an administration fee. Even if you cannot afford the fee, you will not be turned away.
