Suicide Among Youth in Maine




SUICIDE DEATHS

In 2023, 30 youth ages 10-24 died by suicide in Maine. An average of 27 youth suicide deaths occur each year.¹

Figure 1. The age-adjusted rate (per 100,000) of suicide deaths among Maine youth ages 10-24 has slightly decreased since the peak in 2016.2*

Suicide is the **second** leading cause of death among Maine youth **ages 10-24.**³

SUICIDE METHODS

Firearms are used in **59**% of all youth suicide deaths in Maine; **suffocation** (including hanging/strangulation) accounts for **28**% of all youth suicide deaths.⁴

Average number of youth emergency department (ED) visits annually due to intentional self-inflicted injuries.⁵

of all intentional self-harm related **ED visits** were among **youth ages 10-24 years.**⁶

Each year there are approximately 206 hospitalizations due to intentional self-inflicted injuries among Maine youth.⁵

Girls are significantly more likely to be hospitalized due to intentional self-inflicted injuries than **boys**: ⁶



Figure 2. The rate of suicidal ideation related emergency department visits among youth peaked in 2023.8 (Rate per 10,000 Emergency Department Visits)





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DISPARITIES

Female youth are more likely to have suicidal thoughts and attempt suicide.

Girls are significantly more likely to consider suicide than boys:⁷

High School:



23% vs. 13%



Middle School:





Male youth ages 10-24 are more likely to die by suicide accounting for 73% of all youth suicide deaths in Maine.⁴

Male youth are more likely to use a firearm (70%) when attempting suicide than females (22%).¹

High school students who are gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, questioning, or describe their sexual orientation or gender identity in some other way are more likely to consider and attempt suicide.⁷
