Suicide in Maine - 2022 Update **YOUTH (Ages 10-24)**



SUICIDE DEATHS

In 2021, 27 youth between the ages of 10-24 died by suicide in Maine. An average of 28 youth die each year.¹

Figure 1. The age-adjusted rate of suicide deaths has increased since 2006, but recent years had slightly lower rates than the peak in 2016. (Rate per 100,000)¹



The suicide rate among Maine youth ages 10-24 is slightly higher than the U.S. rate:³

> 11.5 vs 10.8 suicides per 100,000



Suicide is the second leading cause of death among Maine youth ages **10-24**²

SUICIDE METHODS

Firearms are used in 54% of all youth suicide deaths in Maine; suffocation (including hanging/strangulation) accounts for 40% of all youth suicide deaths.¹

SUICIDE ATTEMPTS

Average number of youth emergency department (ED) 921 visits annually due to intentional self-inflicted injuries.⁴

45%

of all intentional self-inflicted injury related **ED visits** were among youth aged 10-24 years.⁴

Each year there are approximately 228 hospitalizations due to intentional selfinflicted injuries among Maine youth.⁴

Girls are significantly more likely to be hospitalized due to intentional self-inflicted injuries than **boys**:⁴



127 vs. 49 per 100,000 hospitalizations





of youth **hospitalizations** due to **41%** intentional self-inflicted injuries were among those ages 15-19 vears.⁴

Among Maine high school students:

9% attempted suicide in the past year.⁵

Among Maine middle school students:



8% ever attempted suicide.⁵

SUICIDAL THOUGHTS

Among Maine middle school students:

20% ever seriously considered suicide.⁵

Figure 3. Self-reported suicidal ideation among Maine High School students has been increasing, especially among girls. (Prevalence, %)⁵



DISPARITIES: Sex, Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity

Male youth are more likely to die by suicide than female youth. Female youth are more likely to attempt suicide than male youth.

In Maine, suicide is 8x more likely among male youth than female youth. Males account for **89%** of all youth suicides in Maine.¹

Girls are significantly more likely to consider suicide than boys.⁵



Female youth have significantly higher rates of ED visits and hospitalization due to intentional self-inflicted injuries than male youth.⁴

High school students who are gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, questioning, or identify their sexual orientation or gender identity in some other way are more likely to consider and attempt suicide:5
