TESTING FOR HIV, STIs, and VIRAL HEPATITIS

RECOMMEND OPT-OUT TESTING FOR ALL INDICATED POPULATIONS

- Maine law (2011) requires health care providers to include an HIV test in the standard set of prenatal screening and medical tests.
- Maine law (2023) requires all health care providers to include HIV testing when conducting tests for other STIs.

PEOPLE AT INCREASED RISK

- People who use drugs (injection, intranasal, or crack pipes) or share drug prep equipment
- People with multiple or anonymous sex partners, or who exchange sex for drugs, money, goods, or services
- Male-to-male sexual contact
- People diagnosed or treated for STIs
- People who have sex with someone living with HIV, someone at increased risk for HIV, or whose sexual history is unknown
- People who have been incarcerated (jail or prison)

Footnotes:

- 1) Offer to people who have male-to-male sexual contact and/or have had sex with a known HCV-infected person
- 2) If HIV testing is negative and the person has ongoing risk of exposure to HIV
- 3) Repeat screening may be recommended for anyone with ongoing risk behaviors (including in pregnant persons)
