Lead 101

- What is Lead?
 - A heavy metalIn paint and gasoline
- Where is lead paint?
 - Pre-1950 homes
 - Wooden surfaces
 - Window sills and trim
 - Painted floors and stairs
 - Interior and exterior
 - Not so often on plaster



Lead Poisoning in Children

- Lead is a poison
- Damages the brain
 - Can cause loss of IQ
 - Can have behavioral effects



How does lead poisoning happen?

Dust from Old Lead Paint!

- Settles on floors
- Settles on window sills
- Just takes a little bit to cause lead poisoning

Children get lead dust on hands and toys → put hands and toys in mouth.





Lead Dust Comes From Old Lead Paint

Chipping, peeling, flaking, disturbed paint can create lead dust.

- Normal wear and tear
- Weathering
- Water damage
- Sanding or scraping during repairs or renovation





Risk of Lead Poisoning Greatest In 1 and 2 Year Olds

- Crawling and walking
- Spending time on the floor
- Discovering with their hands and mouths
- Rapidly developing brains





Lead 101: Takeaways

✓ Dust from chipping, peeling, flaking old lead paint found in pre-1950 homes is the most common cause of childhood lead poisoning.

 Lead dust settles on window sills and floors where children play and put their toys.

 Children less than 3 years are most at risk for lead poisoning because of hand to mouth behavior and brain development.

Lead Dust Testing with Home Visitors

- Great educational tool!
- Identifies easily accessible lead
- Prompt blood lead screening
- Prompt actions to make home safer



Lead Dust Testing with Home Visitors Does Not

- Show where the lead dust is coming from
- Provide certified results
- Automatically require the landlord to remove all lead from the home



Role of the Home Visitor

- Determine if clients live in housing that puts them at risk
- Offer home lead dust test
- Help family do test
- Mail completed test to lab
- Use video to refresh training



Home visitors <u>cannot</u> do the test for the family. They can only assist.

Who should do a lead dust test?

- Families with children under age 3
- Expecting parents
- Live in pre-1950 housing
- Focus on families who rent

What Families Need to Know Before Testing

- The choice to do a test is their own, it is not required
- It can help them take actions and make choices to protect their children from lead
- Their landlord might have a negative reaction to dust testing including attempting eviction
- They can choose to not provide landlord contact information on the form
- Very high test results are very risky to children and may result in further testing and enforcement by the Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention

Can a family get evicted because of a lead dust test?

- Tenants have a legal right to test. Landlord cannot retaliate for testing.
- Written lease: Must have reason to evict
- No Lease: no reason needed to evict, but requires notice, and eviction considered retaliatory if in court the landlord can't point to any other reason for the eviction
- Can evict for late/unpaid rent
- To fight eviction you have to go to court.

How To Do a Lead Dust Test Step 1: Preparation

- Bring to home visit:
 - Lead dust test kit
 - Таре
 - Pen
- Have the person doing the test wash their hands
- Identify the areas to test
 - Kitchen floor
 - Floor where child plays
 - Window sill



How To Do a Lead Dust Test Step 2: Testing the Floors

- Tape template to floor
- Have the resident
 - Put on the glove
 - Wipe in one direction with s-shaped motion
 - Fold dirty sides in on themselves
 - Repeat wiping in opposite direction
 - Place wipe in correct tube



Repeat for "other" floor.

How To Do a Lead Dust Test Step 3: Testing the Windowsill

- Measure windowsill
- Have the resident
 - Put on the glove
 - Wipe in one direction
 - Fold dirty sides in on themselves
 - Repeat wiping in opposite direction
 - Place wipe in correct tube



The only wrong way to do the test is to not complete it!

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How To Do a Lead Dust Test Step 5: Mailing the Kit

- Put tubes and the form in the box
- Stick on mailing label
- Tape box shut
- Put kit in mailbox

What Happens Next?

- Lab analysis
- Maine CDC gets results
- Results determine follow-up
 - All results sent by mail to resident
 - Maine CDC staff call residents with high results to talk about next steps
 - Very high results may trigger additional testing
- If tenant provided landlord contact info, results will be sent to landlord.
