<b>Family</b>	For purposes of determining financial eligibility, a family is defined as: A group of related or non-related individuals, who are not residents of an institution or boarding house, but who are living as one economic unit. An economic unit consists of all individuals who share a dwelling unit and either pool income or share expenses in common. Children in the care or custody of MDHHS are exempted from the above definition of family and are considered a family of one.
