

Tips for Engaging Students in Online Learning

Be purposeful in the selection of tools for engaging learners. Consider pedagogy and instructional design practices to ensure that the use of the tool meets the needs of the learners.

Example: Use the Padagogy wheel to explore the use of technology tools for effective engagement.

****Keep in mind that many of these apps are available on both platforms and the computer.** The difference between these wheels is that when you click on an app in the Android wheel, it brings you to that app in the Android app store, and when you click on an app in the Apple wheel, it brings you to that app in the Apple store.

Use social media or another interactive platform to engage learners. Whenever possible, get a sense of what apps your learners are already using and engage with them through those mediums.

Bonus: Ask learners use TikTok to create videos that express a moment in history.

Use crowdsourcing tools to engage learners. This gives them a sense of community involvement by using tools that enable them to make a difference.

Example: Use something like [Zooniverse](#) or [Eyewire](#) to get students engaged in a crowdsourcing project.
