

- Extended Learning Opportunities VR can partner with ELO Coordinators to provide support for students in preparation for, during and after ELO activities – and work to ensure ELO is integrated into a student's employment plan.
- WINDMILLS Curriculum Certified trainers from VR can bring modules of this disability awareness curriculum to your school
- Progressive Employment Working with job seekers and employers, this model brings together students with local employers of interest to them for tours, job shadows, and paid work experience activities.

Driver's Education! NEW!!

- Did you know? Due to recent changes students with disabilities (have a 504 plan or receive special education services – up to age 22 are eligible for driver's education paid through Vocational Rehabilitation.
- Driver's education is considered a "work readiness" activity under Pre-Employment Transition Services

Available in Kennebec, Somerset, Knox, Waldo, Lincoln, Sagadahoc, Androscoggin, Oxford, and Franklin Counties

Summer Opportunities – 2023

- Summer Work Experience Program Paid work experience for high school students with local employers.
- College Bus Tours Travel by coach to visit colleges and universities across the state. Sleep in the dorms, eat in the café, learn about academic supports and college life:
 - Southern Tour: June 26-30
 - Northern Tour: July 31 August 4
- STEP UP Going on its 5th year, this college prep program for students with ASD is held at the University of Maine and offers a 3 credits of course work focusing on college and career readiness, college prep seminars, and social skills programming. Students learn about dorm life and participate in recreational activities on and off campus.
 - July 10 21 Part 1 (on campus)
 - July 24 August 11 Part 2 (virtual)
 - Offered in collaboration with Div. for the Blind and Visually Impaired "College Prep" program
- Virtual Job Club In combination with summer work or as a stand-alone activity, Virtual Job Clubs offer a variety of modules that teach students about the world of work through fun engaging activities.
- PEERS® UCLA-developed 14-week social skills curriculum delivered via certified trainers over Zoom. New Cohort forming late May - Open to ages 14-24 with ASD. Practical and fun!
