ARP EANS II Overview

- The American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act of 2021 authorized a second round of funding for non-public schools within the GEER funding to provide services or assistance to non-public schools.
- The ARP EANS is like section 312(d) of the CRRSA Act with two exceptions.
 - A State educational agency (SEA) may only provide services or assistance to non-public schools that enroll a significant percentage of students from low-income families and are most impacted by COVID-19.
 - A SEA may not use ARP EANS funds to provide reimbursements to any non-public school for costs the school incurred to address the impact of COVID-19 emergency.
- Administered by the Maine Department of Education (DOE)



ARP EANS II Eligibility Criteria

For the purposes of the ARP EANS II Program, an eligible nonpublic school is an elementary or secondary school that: ☐ Is non-profit Is accredited, licensed, or otherwise operates in accordance with State law. □ Was in existence prior to March 13, 2020, the date COVID-19 was declared a national emergency. □**Did not**, and will not, **apply for and receive a loan under** the Small Business Administration's Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) (15 U.S.C. 636(a)(37)) that is made on or after December 27, 2020. This limitation applies for as long as the non-public school is a participant in the EANS program under the ARP Act. Serves 25% or greater percentage of students from lowincome families.

Concepts to Remember

- The purpose of the ARP EANS II program is to provide non-public schools with funding for eligible services and assistance through procurement only.
- This is not a grant program for non-public schools.
- The Maine DOE retains control of funds and title to materials and equipment.



ARP EANS II

A SEA may only provide services or assistance to nonpublic schools that enroll a significant percentage of students from low-income families

 As a result of the U.S. Department of Education (USED) recommendation that the non-public school must serve 40%+ of students from low-income families enrolled we were aware that few Maine Non-Publics would qualify at this percentage. The Maine DOE chose an Alternative Significant Percentage

September 9, 2022

A tiered approach was provided on the ARP EANS II Application which was submitted to the USED on September 9, 2021.

March 16, 2022

The Maine Department of Education and the Office of Federal Emergency Relief Programs received notification that Maine's ARP EANS II application was approved with a 25% poverty threshold.



ARP EANS II Threshold

The Maine DOE will prioritize non-public schools serving students through a tiered approach with an alternate significant percentage threshold of 25% with our non-public schools enrolling a higher percentage of students from low-income families with the greatest per pupil amount.

The tiered approach will be broken down into the following, highest per pupil amount to the lowest per pupil amount, for all eligible non-public schools:

- •non-public school serving 40% or more students from low-income families
- •non-public school serving 35% or more students from low-income families
- •non-public school serving 30% or more students from low-income families
- non-public school serving 25% or more students from low-income families

Any non-public school serving less than 25% of students from low-income families will not be eligible to participate in the Maine DOE's ARP EANS program.

Services or assistance to non-public schools under Section 2002(a) of the ARP Act are limited to "non-public schools that enroll a significant percentage of students from low-income families and are most impacted by the COVID-19 emergency."

Accordingly, the Maine Department of Education requests that the non-public school provide the data described below. Such data must not include personally-identi?able information about students or their families.

Please note that in addition to meeting the definition of a non-public school in section 316(6) of the CRRSAAct, a non-public school must meet or exceed the US Department of Education's state approved significant poverty percentage of 25% or greater. The non-public school is ineligible to participate in the ARP EANS II program if the school's low-income percentage is less than 25% of the student population.

Information about the data request below. The National School Lunch Program is a federally assisted meal program operating in public and nonprofit private schools and residential childcare institutions. It provides nutritionally balanced, low-cost or free lunches to children each school day. The program was established under the National School Lunch Act, signed by President Harry Truman in 1946. ARP EANS II COVID-19

Additional factors that the Maine DOE will use to determine which non-public schools are most impacted by the COVID-19 emergency, include:

- Data from the cumulative COVID-19 cases reported by zip code, which identifies probable and confirmed cases. The non-public school community zip code will be the identifier for this data set that will be assessed at the beginning of October 2021. This publicly available data set is released by the Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and accessed at https://www.maine.gov/dhhs/mecdc/infectious-disease/epi/airborne/coronavirus/data.shtml.
- Loss of Maine student tuition revenue as a result of declining student enrollment, which was reported in the CRRSA EANS intent to apply. The information requested on the CRRSA EANS intent to apply included student tuition revenue and student enrollment for October 2018, October 2019, and October 2020. Within the American Rescue Plan (ARP) EANS application the student tuition and student enrollment for school year 2021-2022 will be collected.
- Learning loss attributed to the COVID-19 emergency, which presented in a wide variety of educational barriers and disruptions. Some examples of the educational barriers and disruptions might include: insufficient technological support, loss of instructional time, family concerns for child(ren) safety and emotional well-being, and/or a decrease in student, attendance in all modes of instruction (hybrid, remote, in-person).
- Lack of resources to address safety measures, recruit and retain educational staff, and promote social distancing.

ARP EANS II Allowable Uses

Eligible Services and Assistance

A nonpublic school may apply to receive services or assistance to address educational disruptions resulting from COVID-19 for:

- Supplies to sanitize, disinfect, and clean school facilities
- Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)
- Improving ventilation systems, including windows or portable air purification systems
- Training and professional development for staff on sanitation, the use of PPE, and minimizing the spread of infectious diseases
- Physical barriers to facilitate social distancing
- COVID-19 testing and tracing
- Educational technology
- Redeveloping instructional plans for remote or hybrid learning or to address learning loss
- Leasing sites or spaces to ensure social distancing
- Reasonable transportation costs
- Other materials, supplies, or equipment recommended by the CDC for reopening and operation of school facilities to effectively maintain health and safety
- Initiating and maintaining education and support services or assistance for remote or hybrid learning or to address learning loss
