## Navigating Text-to-Speech in the State Solutions Secure Browser

Different assessment secure browsers have different text-to-speech tools. Please provide all students utilizing text-to-speech an opportunity to practice using the tool via the Item Type Sampler, available <u>online</u> and within the State Solutions Secure Browser.

To access the text-to-speech tool, students select the "Speak" icon:

The text-to-speech tool in the State Solutions Secure Browser allows the student to select between

reading aloud all text on the screen Play , or
 selecting a specific word, sentence, or paragraph Word Sentence Paragraph.

Note: Text-to-speech will not read aloud the reading passages on the Reading assessment.

## Mathematics Assessment: Universal Tools, Designated Supports, and Accommodations

### **Universal Tools: Provided to ALL Students**

- Scrap Paper: Blank, lined, or graph paper, and should not include additional marking, such as axes. Individual erasable whiteboards and AT devices are also acceptable forms of "scrap paper."
- <u>Math Reference Sheet</u>: Available in the State Solutions Secure Browser and can also be provided as a
  paper copy. For translated copies of the Math Reference Sheet, please navigate to the *Content* dropdown menu on the <u>Maine Through Year Assessment webpage</u>. Changes to the Math Reference Sheet,
  including additions, deletions, and edits, are not allowed.

- Calculator: Available in the assessment platform for questions for which they are appropriate (i.e., which do not assess computation); for students accessing a paper-based test in grades 6+, students are provided a calculator for a portion of the assessment
- Graph paper in the online assessment platform: Plots points, line segments, and lines
- Protractor in the online assessment platform: Available for specific questions if necessary for the skill being assessed
- Ruler in the online assessment platform: Available for specific questions if necessary for the skill being assessed

#### Designated Supports: Provided to Individual Students Based on Need (IEP or 504 Plan NOT Required)


- Mathematical Supports MUST be consistent with classroom instruction and assessment <u>and MUST be</u> indicated in the student's profile in Acacia
  - Examples from the <u>Accessibility Guide</u>: Abacus, Number line, Addition chart, Multiplication chart (not allowable for grade 3), Base-ten blocks, Various types of counters, Fraction tiles and pies without numerical labels, Coins, Clock with or without numbers (should not have gears)
  - Examples from Maine Schools: Graph paper with axes lines but no X or Y labels, organizational supports which do not provide the steps for calculation or problem-solving (See the image to the right for an example.)
  - Mathematical Supports do NOT change the skill being assessed. If you are unsure if a particular mathematical tool changes the skill being assessed, please reach out to Krista Averill at Krista.Averill@maine.gov for clarification. This determination is made based on the Common Core State Standards and the standards' associated achievement level descriptors specific to the Maine Through Year Assessment.



### Accommodations: For Students with IEPs or 504 Plans ONLY

• Calculator for ALL questions: This is provided by the proctor to the student, not in the assessment platform.

**Now:** Assessment Coordinators can assign supports/accommodations and access test tickets <u>for students in</u> <u>grades 5 & 8</u>

<u>All students must be assigned to a class (i.e., proctor group) in ADAM</u>. Here are directions for the <u>Quick Class Upload</u>. As enrollments change, you can identify <u>Unrostered Students</u> in order to add them to classes.

You can also update student supports and accommodations <u>for an individual student</u> or <u>in bulk</u> as well as <u>Create Additional Proctor Groups</u>, if needed.

## Reseating Students With "Session in Use" Notification

The Maine Science Support Desk has become aware of a handful of reported instances where students have needed to log in several times (requiring reseating by the proctor) before they could start a session of the assessment. These appear to be isolated cases, though in the schools that have had the issue there are sometimes multiple students who experienced it. Reseating by the standard reseating process has resolved these cases and the students were able to complete their assessments.

Although the affected students may receive a notification upon their first log in that their session is in use and the proctor dashboard may show them as already in progress after their first attempted login, **these students' sessions have not already been opened.** 

Indications point to local network disturbance or lower bandwidth causing inconsistencies while logging in. This phenomenon may be more common on MacBook devices. Network causes can also result in students being "kicked out"/ having their session disrupted more than once if the classroom's Internet connection is dropping repeatedly. Should students receive this notice, they can be reseated by the proctor from the Proctor Dashboard and then either retry their login using the Retry button or by selecting the Exit button and then re-entering their Test Code and student ID number. Proctors should remember to refresh their dashboard after selecting to Reseat individual students from the Action menu ("three dots" menu). Should a proctor choose to use the Reseat All button at the top of the Dashboard, they should be aware that this will disrupt students in the group who are already testing -- who may also then need to log back in to resume their session.

In preparation for the grades 5 and 8 assessment window:

- Make sure your proctors are familiar with the process for reseating students should an issue arise. (<u>Proctor User Guide</u>)

### NAEP 2026

Sampling for NAEP 2026 is under way. The **NAEP 2026 Assessment Window for administration is January 26**, **2026 – March 20, 2026.** SAUs are scheduled to be notified in early June with school notifications to follow shortly thereafter. The NAEP 2026 Mathematics and Reading assessments have updated frameworks and new items. Additional new items will be administered via pilot assessments during the 2026 assessment window.

Moving forward, **NAEP will be administered using school Wi-Fi when the assessment is administered on school devices**. This transition began with the 2024 administration with participating students successfully completing the NAEP assessments in over 90% of Maine schools using school provided Wi-Fi. Additional details will be provided as we move closer to the assessment administration window.

Most students at NAEP sampled schools using Chromebooks and/or Windows devices will be assessed using school devices for the administration of the 2026 Mathematics and Reading Assessments. Students at schools using iOS devices will be assessed using NAEP Chromebooks for the 2026 administration. When NAEP devices are used the assessments will be administered using a NAEP Private Network. Additional details will be provided during future Assessment Team Office Hours and supplemental NAEP Office Hours as well as through email communications.

#### NAEP 2024 Reporting

The NAEP 2024 Mathematics and Reading results were released as the <u>Nation's Report Card</u> on January 29, 2025.

### Notable changes for future NAEP administrations:

- The transition to school devices will include iOS devices with the 2028 administration of the NAEP Mathematics and Reading Assessments.
- NAEP will begin the transition to a multi-stage adaptive assessment. Additional information is forthcoming.
- The NAEP 2028 Science assessment will be based on the updated NAEP 2028 Science Framework.

## April 2025 NAEP Nugget:

Did you know that the National Assessment Governing Board has provided an easy-to-use interactive tool that allows anyone to explore national, state, and district pandemic-era score changes?

Depending on the jurisdiction, grade, and assessment subject, NAEP Scores were plateauing or reclining prior to the pandemic. To investigate how scores changed during the pandemic use the <u>interactive data tool</u> to explore results.

## **Special Consideration Exemption Requests**

#### What is a Special Consideration exemption request?

A Special Consideration is a request for a student to be exempt from participation in a required Maine Educational Assessment (MEA) due to reasons of significant medical emergency.

### When can Special Consideration exemption requests be submitted?

This request **must** be submitted within the open assessment window of each specific applicable assessment.

- Maine Through Year Assessment Special Consideration exemption requests can be submitted until May 30.
- Maine Science Assessment Special Consideration exemption requests for Grades 5 & 8 may be submitted May 12 May 23.
- The windows for submitting a Special Consideration exemption request for the High School Maine Science Assessment, the MSAA, and WIDA ACCESS have passed.

### What is a "significant medical emergency"?

This includes long-term hospitalization without access to academics, severe trauma, mental health crisis (student is a danger to self or others), or placement in hospice care. A medical emergency may also include medically fragile students who are not able to participate in *any* academic activity and/or statewide assessment due to a debilitating disease.

### What are examples of situations that do not meet the criteria for a Special Consideration exemption?

- Family vacations
- Suspensions and truancy
- The presence of a disability, without meeting the requirements outlined above
- The presence of significant medical conditions, without meeting the requirements outlined above
- Placement at an out-of-state school, without meeting the requirements outlined above
- Parent or student refusal

### What documentation is required to support the request for a Special Consideration exemption request?

Medical documentation must be from a medically trained professional on official letterhead.

Examples of medical emergency documentation include:

- Medical professional or doctor's note
- Medical records or narrative from a medical professional explaining the need for exemption
- Admittance to a hospital or other placement

The documentation must provide evidence for one of the criteria for a significant medical emergency:

- long-term hospitalization without access to academics
- severe trauma
- mental health crisis (student is a danger to self or others)

- placement in hospice care
- inability to participate in *any* academic activity and/or statewide assessment due to a debilitating disease
- for students receiving education remotely, inability to participate in *any* in-person instruction and assessment

Documentation from a medical provider that does not provide evidence of a significant medical emergency may not be approved.
