Community Eligibility Provision

Don't miss this opportunity to participate in CEP to the MAX!

With cuts potentially coming to SNAP and Medicare, your DC list will most likely not be as robust as it was on April 1, 2025.

Be sure to take the time to double-check your matches before submitting. Have you checked for:

- Addresses (different names, same household)
- Nonmatching names (Mohammed, Mohammad, Muhammad)
- Missing suffix (Jr/Sr) or hyphens Jones-Smith
- Birthdates that are transposed (05/12/2019 or 05/21/2019)
- Requested and received your Head Start and Homeless lists from those program liaisons

Every single addition to the list will make a big difference and meeting that 50% threshold has multiple benefits.

Let's round the difference between paid and free meals to \$4.00 Out of 175 days the student eats at school 160 day

160 days x \$4/day is \$640 that we could be reimbursed with federal funds if the student is matched on the DC list. Think of what a difference you could make by finding matches for 5 students, and then your colleagues in 20 other districts did the same? \$64,000/year and..this data is good for 4 years and there are 214 sponsors in the state...

Let's help our schools, our communities and help secure Healthy School Meals for All! Reminders:

- The deadline to submit documentation is June 30, 2025
- Master Complete Enrollment List & DC list must be submitted in EXCEL
- Documents must be uploaded into CNP Web
- David Hartley must be notified once documents have been uploaded.
- Superintendents' signature is now needed only at the end of the process

USDA Memos

USDA Policy Memo: Supporting Local Food in School Meals

The USDA has reaffirmed its commitment to local food procurement in Child Nutrition Programs with the release of memo SP 11-2025, CACFP 09-2025, SFSP 05-2025. Schools and program sponsors are reminded they can use federal funds to purchase locally grown or raised foods to serve in meal programs like NSLP, CACFP, and SFSP. This includes using geographic preference, small purchases, USDA Foods, and the DoD Fresh Program to support local economies and healthier meals for kids. USDA Policy Memo: Appropriations Act 2025 – Key Child Nutrition Program Updates

The USDA has issued memo SP 13-2025, CACFP 10-2025, SFSP 06-2025 summarizing provisions from the Full-Year Continuing Appropriations and Extensions Act, 2025, affecting child nutrition programs:

- Vegetable Flexibility at Breakfast: Schools may continue substituting any vegetable for fruit in breakfast menus without subgroup requirements for the rest of SY 2024–2025. Standard vegetable subgroup rules return in SY 2025–2026.
- Ban on Chinese Poultry/Seafood: Program funds may not be used to buy raw or processed chicken or seafood from China through September 30, 2025.
- PLE Exemptions: Only SFAs with negative food service balances as of June 30, 2024, must meet Paid Lunch Equity requirements in SY 2025–2026.

USDA Policy Memo: New Guidance on Paid Lunch Equity for SY 2025-2026

USDA has released memo SP 12-2025 outlining Paid Lunch Equity (PLE) requirements for School Year 2025–2026. Under the 2025 Appropriations Act, only School Food Authorities (SFAs) with a negative food service account balance as of June 30, 2024, must follow PLE pricing rules. SFAs with zero or positive balances are exempt but must document their status. All SFAs must continue reporting lunch prices. Full details and tools will follow in a separate communication.

SUN Bucks letters for families that are automatically enrolled will be going out next week. Please be sure to share this with school staff, as questions may be coming in. Thank you!

SUN Bucks provide a \$120 EBT benefit for each child who qualifies to spend on groceries while school is out. Most eligible kids will be automatically enrolled in the program and don't have to apply. Families should keep an eye out for a letter in the mail with notice of automatic enrollment.

How does SUN Bucks work?

SUN Bucks benefits are loaded onto an EBT card and can be used to buy food like fruits, vegetables, meat, whole grains, and dairy at grocery stores, farmers markets, and other places that accept EBT benefits.

How do I get SUN Bucks?

Automatic Enrollment

Your child will be automatically enrolled for SUN Bucks and does not need to

- Your child will be accentionable an application for school meal benefit and were found eligible or Age 6-16 and part of a household that already participates in SNAP, FDPIR, TANF, MaineCare at 185% FPL or identified as foster, homeless, or migrant by OFI or OCFS.

Keep an eye out! Automatically enrolled households will receive benefits starting in June on an existing Pine Tree card or on a new EBT card in the mail.

Manual Application

Most families will be automatically enrolled. If you haven't received a letter in the mail by June, consider applying for SUN Bucks before August 15 if:

- Your child attends a school that offers the National School Lunch or School Breakfast Program, and
- Your household meets the requirements for free or reduced-price school meal benefit.

Do you have a new address?

Make sure your address is up to date with your school and with the Office for Family Independence so your SUN Bucks benefits are sent to the right place!
