This week in second grade we have been learning about how we can make our school a better place for all learners.


Try one of these activities with your child each day. Mark the activities you do, and have your child return this sheet to school at the end of the week.

Go to the library or look on your home bookshelf to find other books that tell a story or give information about children's experiences in school. You might also find stories about people who have changed or invented something.


#### **Reading Log**


