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Summary of Education-Related Bills Enacted by the Second Regular Session of the 130th Maine Legislature

LD 174, Public Law 2021, Chapter 677 An Act To Implement Maine's Roadmap to End Hunger by 2030	 Requires the Commissioner of the Department of Agriculture, Conservation & Forestry act as the lead among departments and agencies of State Government to implement a strategic plan to end hunger in the State by 2030. Directs the Commissioner of the Department of Agriculture, Conservation & Forestry establish an advisory committee made up of members with expertise relevant to the strategic plan to end hunger including, but not limited to, expertise related to economic development, employment, housing, children's issues, health care, education, transportation, emergency food and the social safety net as well as expertise that derives from lived experience of poverty and food insecurity. Directs the advisory committee submit a report by January 1, 2023 and annually to 2030 to the Joint Standing Committees on Agriculture, Conservation & Forestry, Health & Human Services, Labor & Housing, Transportation, and Innovation, Development, Economic Advancement & Business regarding activities and progress made toward ending hunger in the State by 2030. Authorizes these Joint Standing Committees to submit legislation each year. Directs the Governor's Office of Policy Innovation and the Future coordinate the implementation of strategies to build infrastructure and increase capacity to end hunger in the State as outlined in the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry January 2022 report, "Everyone at the Table: Maine's Roadmap to End Hunger by 2030." Provides to the Governor's Office of Policy Innovation and the Future General Fund allocations for one Public Service Coordinator II position and related All Other costs to support the coordination, communications and activities of the strategic plan to end hunger in the State by 2030. LD 176, Private & Special Law 2021, Chapter 22 An Act To Facilitate a Grade 9 to 16 School Project	 This Private and Special Law: Authorizes the voters of School Administrative District No. 4, School Administrative District No. 41 and School Administrative District No. 46 to form a community school district. If formed, the new community school district is authorized to construct a regional high school integrated with career and technical education and postsecondary educational opportunities that the State Board of Education has placed on the approved projects list. Authorizes the voters of Regional School Unit No. 64 to participate and join the community school district. The member school administrative units continue to exist for all purposes of kindergarten and grades 1 to 8, and for prekindergarten if applicable, notwithstanding the provisions of the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, sections 1258 and 1479. LD 598, Public Law 2021, Chapter 643 An Act To Prohibit Discrimination in Employment and School Based on Hair Texture or Hairstyle	 Amends the Maine Human Rights Act to prohibit discrimination in employment and in education based on hair texture or hairstyle. Adds to definitions that use of the term "race" includes traits that are associated with race, including hair texture, Afro hairstyles and protective hairstyles and "protective hairstyles" includes braids, twists and locks. Text based on language adopted in Maryland and referred to as the CROWN Act, which is an acronym for Creating a Respectful and Open World for Natural Hair. 	August 8, 2022

Sets a goal applicable, to the extent practicable, to the Department of Administrative and Financial Services, Bureau of General Services, Central Fleet Management Division and the Department of Public Safety, combined, of 50% of light-duty motor vehicle purchases and leases acquired annually being plug-in hybrid electric vehicles and zero-emission vehicles by 2025 and 100% by 2030.
