PROGRAM NOTES

ESSER Obligation

§ 200.71 Obligations: When used in connection with a non-Federal entity's utilization of funds under a Federal award, obligations means orders placed for property and services, contracts and subawards made, and similar transactions during a given period that require payment by the non-Federal entity during the same or a future period.

CRRSA	September 30, 2023

The OFERP team presented some background and application information but focused on invoicing, the reimbursement process, good practices, definitions and distinctions.

The Maine Department of Education (DOE) operates federal grant reimbursement systems which means the good and/or service must be received or rendered prior to requesting a reimbursement. Due to State Statute, the DOE is unable to reimburse for any down payment type of requests. Please reach out to the OFERP to discuss how the project(s) can be broken down into phases with deliverables, which would allow for a reimbursement request to be made once a project phase and deliverables have been completed.

Summer accrual payments are charges for work that has been done but not yet invoiced or paid out. SAUs can only seek reimbursement for summer accrual payments after the employee has received the payment.



Showcasing the Use of ESSER Funds

The U.S. Department of Education established the <u>interim final requirements</u> (IFR) for the American Rescue Plan (ARP) ARP Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund but are relevant to CARES and CRRSA. The IFR requirements are intended to promote accountability, transparency, and effective use of funds.

With a growing interest in what ESSER Funds are supporting a number of outlets are sharing information. The OFERP encourages schools to use data and feedback to empower school leaders to communicate confidently with stakeholders, ensure appropriate use of ESSER funds to impact student learning, proactively plan to sustain evidence-based interventions, and showcase ESSER projects.
